

Enthusiastic Liberals Elect Dr. David Marshall

"The campaign starts tonight."

A jubilant Dr. T. David Marshall, 33, Tuesday night overwhelmed all opposition to be elected Liberal candidate in the upcoming federal election by the Haldimand-Norfolk Liberal Association and as far as he was concerned, the campaign was on.

An overflow crowd estimated at 1,000, at the Jarvis Community Centre, thundered their approval of Dr. Mar-

shall as their candidate.

Two others had stood for nomination, John Pow, 56, of Woodhouse and Jack Lang, of Oneida. Mr. Lang declined his nomination.

In his speech of acceptance of the nomination Dr. Marshall said that in a democratic society people have the power to grant responsibility to a relatively small number of individuals. The elected representative then must represent the people, their in-

terests and present their case to the best of his ability.

Dr. Marshall said an elected representative must be "seriously concerned with the welfare of his constituents."

He said to undertake such a position required serious reflection, but that he believed "it is the responsibility of each of us in life to make whatever contribution he can to the betterment of mankind."

However, "I can offer you no magic. I don't believe there is any magic in life. I believe that preparation, diligence and tenacity are the tools of success both in life itself and in this election."

Dr. Marshall was nominated by Ross Gee and the nomination was seconded by Earl Johnston.

Mr. Gee noted in his nomination speech that Dr. Marshall entered the University

of Toronto medical school at age 17 and graduated with honors in 1963.

During his summer vacations he took a course in political science at Harvard University and a course in economics at McMaster University.

While maintaining his medical practice, he entered Osgoode Hall law school where he graduated in 1970.

In 1971 he was appointed lecturer in law and medicine at the

University of Toronto. While conducting lectures he took his Bar admissions course and was the only lecturer student at the university.

This year he was admitted to the Bar, the only such individual qualified to practice both law and medicine in Ontario and one of about six in Canada, Mr. Gee said.

Tax Changes May Advance Stelco's Nanticoke Project

In light of recent tax changes, the Steel Company of Canada's Nanticoke project may soon be confirmed for a start in 1975.

"The federal budget changes have made our Lake Erie project a more viable undertaking," Stelco president Peter Gordon said recently.

"We are now re-examining the whole project and may advance the construction start on our first plant, a wide hot strip mill."

Stelco officials believe the two-year

rapid write-offs on machinery and processing equipment used in manufacturing and reduced corporation tax will provide a strong incentive for business expansion. This should be reflected in increased demand for steel, they say.

The Stelco project of an integrated steel making facility at Nanticoke was postponed two years ago when the federal government began its study of tax changes.

Other factors such as the high cost of borrowed funds and

volatile labor also contributed to the slowdown.

Three months ago Stelco held a meeting in Simcoe to announce the company would definitely be going ahead with the project at Nanticoke.

Company vice-president Alex Fisher, who is in charge of the Nanticoke project, said the company would have to be producing steel by the late 1970s, which meant a likely starting date

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Dogs, Or Wolves, Blamed In Death Of Five Sheep

Dogs, or perhaps wolves, have been blamed in the death of a purebred sheep and four lambs in Walpole Township. Township Council Friday was presented with a statement valuing the loss at \$250. Four other lambs were injured.

Clerk David Wilson said there was no trace of the animal or animals that killed the sheep and that it had occurred during the night.

Deputy-reeve Bruce Meehan said the attack "could have been more than dogs. There are

some wolves around now and I've heard them at night up our way."

Mr. Meehan noted that council hadn't been presented with any losses of farm live stock "for some time."

In other business, council decided it would permit Ontario Hydro to erect a permanent sign at its Nanticoke Generating Station. The sign would be seven feet tall and 16 feet long and would be illuminated.

Council decided it could agree with the sign, but would check its bylaws governing signs with its consultant.
