In other matters, council gave approval to Sanduski Construction Ltd., who is building the 18 unit townhouse development near the Explorer Inn, to bring in three water lines, rather than the proposed one.

However, council noted, the company would be responsible for the increase in costs and would have to use fittings up to the village standards.

The Kinsmen require approval from council, the police, fire department and department of health before being able to get a licence from the liquor licence board.
