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#### **Editorial Comment:**

## **New Regional Area**

Continuing to emphasize the role of planning in Ontario, the provincial treasurer Darcy McKeough this week outlined the formation of five planning regions for the province.

The five planning regions will take the place of the 10 economic regions in existence in Ontario since the mid-1950s.

The planning regions will be designated for eastern Ontario, central Ontario, southern and western Ontario, North-eastern Ontario and northwestern Ontario.

Mr. McKeough outlined the new scheme before 1,000 members at the founding convention of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

As Mr. McKeough explained the new bodies will fill the role of advising the government on the regional development aspects of various provincial economic and social policies and programs. The 10 existing economic councils were never

designed to be units of implementation of plans. This has always been one of the confusing aspects of the regional economic councils that the public and for that matter the members themselves were never quite able to adjust to.

There was also confusion around the economic councils since the introduction of regional municipalities. For Haldimand and Norfolk, which are expected to be designated a regional municipality, they lay in two different economic council areas - Norfolk in the Lake Erie Regional Economic Council and Haldimand in the Niagara

With the abolition of these economic councils, at least one stage of confusion should be

In his 51-page presentation, Mr. McKeough told the delegates the new planning regions will form the basis for as many regional administrative activities as possible. He said it is the government's intention that the regional development program work much more closely with municipal governments.

He noted that this would be especially important in areas where reorganized municipal governments are, or will be, established. Mr. McKeough stated that while it would be possible to persue a successful regional development program without significant participation by local government, to do so would be a complete violation of the "government's commitment to a working relationship with local government."

"As we see it, " Mr. McKeough said, "the cities, counties and regions of Ontario will be the most important bodies in the implementation of the regional planning and development for this province."

Policy statements such as that should go a long way towards assuring those areas now going through a change over to regional municipal government that the provincial government is indeed going to be returning many of the responsibilities to the local governments that are now lost to the province.

As a result, the role of the provincial government should also be changing to one of policy making with the mechanics being left to local regions and the five provincial regions.




