Host Families Sought In Urban-Rural Exchange

During this month a search is being made for host families to Rural Exchange Program, co-ordinated by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food. This program is to provide an opportunity for farmers to show city people through personal experience the pleasures and problems of farm life. The exchange is organized in such a manner to allow urban students, age 12 to 15, from cities of 50,000 plus, to spend a week during July or August on a farm.

These young people will be expected to participate in the regular life of the farm family. It's part of the "learning experience" which is the main objective of the program. If the visit seems to be a holiday, it probably is! The participants

ants in this program are young people who have never lived or had the opportunity to be on a farm for a period of time. Selections are being made through the elementary and secondary schools of the urban community.

The exchange will be brief on farm safety and the type of life which can be expected on a particular host farm prior to the visit. While on the exchange insurance will cover in case of accident and liability.

The rural youth will be in contact with the city too. The exchange to the city is being arranged for the week following the urban visit. If however the children are busy on the farm during the summer the return visit is optional. Insurance will also cover the exchange to the city.

It's a good, valuable program. But it needs your support! If you are a farm family interested in hosting, please contact Donna Sharp, Program Co-ordinator, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, Cayuga (772-3381). With 4,000 urban youth applications in Ontario, host farms are in demand. Therefore the host farm doesn't have to have a young person of the same age.

ing a visit to Canada and he had to pay the costs since she had no insurance. He also had to fly twice to Belgium to see his dying brother.

In October he ordered the hospital book-keeper Clair Dennis, to withdraw \$232 from the hospital account for him, Crown Attorney Collins said.

The money went to meet a mortgage payment on the Decewville house.

Dennis, who had been threatened with dismissal, was "afraid not to do what he was asked to do for fear of being discharged," the Crown Attorney said.

He said Dennis was exonerated of complicity in the thefts during the investigation.

Since then, however, he has been transferred from the office staff and is now driving ambulance.

"It was not until February 1972 that the bank woke up sufficiently to do something (about the situation) that to anyone would appear to be irregular," Crown Attorney Collins said.

By then, Van De Ven was into the hospital for \$22,413, according to the hospital board's auditors or \$23,194, according to provincial investigators.

staff of approximately 100.

Until two years ago anyone admitted made over his or her assets to the Home, but now the family, if there is one, may look after the relatives.

Patients who have nothing but the old age pension are completely cared for at \$3.50 per day and \$25. of the pension is turned back to the patient for his own use.

Those having private means may be charged as much as \$8.75 per day, but each case is judged on its own merits and this may not be considered as hard and fast.

He spoke of services provided. The Tuck shop provides interest to those who are able to work for entertainment and earn a bit for luxuries, gifts etc. Entertainment includes bus trip, largely provided by local clubs, churches etc. plus a \$25. fund built up from bequests, the interest of which is used for extras as needed.

Because Dunnville residents are on the spot they provide most of the extras including visits. Those residents of Haldimand in the outlying districts might provide materials with which the patients may employ themselves and sell to visitors.

A craft worker for full time and one part time are on hand to help and direct those able to take part in any social work. Plants are enjoyed, many like to be useful in folding serviettes, pushing wheel chairs and helping those less able than themselves.

Employees include 19 kitchen help, 11 house-keeping staff, 42 nursing of whom 7 are registered nurses. Six couples are in their own quarters, four are laundry employees and a doctor is on call.

Mrs. Smuck thanked Mr. Montague who freely answered questions, stressing that each case is different. A small gift was presented to the speaker.
