

Special Service For Robert Hyde

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hyde assisted in the morning worship service at Hagersville United Church, on Sunday May 21, at 11 a.m. This was a service of recognition and presentation to Robert Hyde, B.A.B.D., to be ordained at Waterloo University, and serve a pastorate in Saskatchewan beginning in July.

Chairman of the Board of Stewards, Robert Nelson presented Mr. Hyde with a clergy gown. President of the United Church Women, Mrs. George Murdoch, chose appropriate words in presenting to him a travelling communion set on behalf of the two units of women from the Church.

Speaking briefly, Clerk of Session Oliver Sayer, commented how proud indeed he was to have had Mr. Hyde in his Sunday School class in previous years. The sermon, entitled The Ministry, was prepared and presented by both Rev. Martin Rule, and Mr. Hyde. Mr. Rule told how well he recalled being in the same circumstances as Mr. Hyde, just standing at the home Church, in his instance Livingstone United, in 1961, and also receiving a Clergy gown.

Rev. Rule stated there were many joys in the vocation of ministry, but he would dwell on only three, namely, Dialogue, which involved the listening, talking, sharing of problems of others; Caring, where at times someone needed a minister to care for their well-being, attitude to life, and thirdly Tradition,

which involved the functioning in a traditional manner of the Church life and way. Mr. Hyde in the concluding portion of the dialogue message, spoke on the various images in the ministry, and how he, as a ready to be ordained minister of the United Church, had ideas, many of which he was ready and willing to put to the test.

He said he had three points to stress, the Call to the Ministry, as like a fish to the water, some get caught in the net of life, others are weak and unable to

face the challenge or test; Changing of Theology, whereby a minister is able to do so much, and members of a congregation must also assist, and likewise do their part; and lastly Function of the Ministry, where he said several years ago, the minister was second or third on the list of respected jobs, whereby today he is down to seventh or eighth on the list.

His closing remarks were "Let us promise to seek God's truth together with you, and not apart".

REPORT

CAYUGA - On June 17 at 2.45 a.m., four persons were injured as a result of a vehicle operated by James Gibson, Cayuga, leaving the road and striking a telephone pole on the McKenzie Road at the 5th Line, Oneida Twp.

Two of the injured parties were taken to the Hamilton General Hospital by the West Haldimand Ambulance. Mr. Gibson's car was declared a total wreck. Fifteen other motor vehicle collisions were investigated, resulting in injuries sustained to three persons. Six of the sixteen collisions occurred on county or township roads.

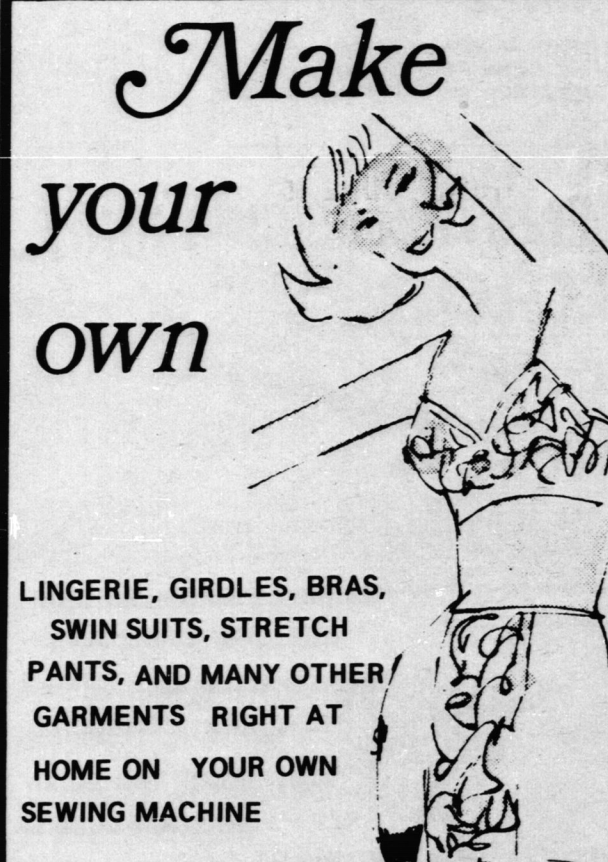
Seneca Twp. by Cayuga OPP.
