

On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - The federal government has extended the deadline for applications from Ontario wheat producers for payment under the two-price wheat program.

The deadline was May 10. The extension is to June 30.

Any eligible producers who marketed wheat during the past four years are asked to pick up application forms from their local agricultural representative.

So far about 12,000 applications have been filed. Records kept by the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board indicate that more applications could be expected if all farmers took advantage of the program. The co-operation of producers is solicited so that calculations and payments can be made as soon as possible.

The federal government has announced a program to remove excess hens from the Canadian laying flocks in order to reduce the surplus of eggs that is now disrupting marketing channels. The fowl slaughter program could amount to a payment to producers of 90 cents per bird provided an additional 1,000,000 hens in Canada are slaughtered (over the normal slaughterings) during the next six weeks.

A sliding scale of payments to encourage maximum removal of surplus birds within the shortest possible time has been put into the program.

The program will be effective from June 5 and will end on July 29.

To receive assist-

ance under the federal subsidy program, producers will require proof of sale to a registered poultry processing plant or a recognized certificate of disposal.

Twenty Ontario farm management specialists have just had their first training session in preparation for the Grain Crops Workshop. The first workshop of this kind in Ontario will be held in Ridgeway, July 3, 4 and 17. This Purdue University program for "Top Farmers" will be led by Purdue University professors and assisted by Ontario farm management specialists.

The recent two day training session left the local staff tremendously enthused with the potential value of this farm planning program for the "Top Ontario Farmer".

Already 60 farmers have enrolled for the course. Since the course is limited to 80 farmers another 20 can yet be enrolled. Detailed information is available at each county office of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Maybe you would be interested in knowing something about lawn bowling so we will start with etiquette of lawn bowling.

Etiquette in lawn bowling, as in any other endeavour, is simply custom in lawn bowling is to shake hands at the end of the game. Be a gracious winner and a good loser. It is those little acts that make the game such a wonderful creator of sociability and friendship.

These acts of courtesy are the unwritten laws of the game. It is a nice gesture to commend a good bowl of your opponent, and of a player on your own team; you will find that he will do the same for you. Admit a fluke in good spirit.

It is not etiquette to follow your bowl up the green as it ends to obscure your opponent's view of the run of the bowl.

Do not cross behind a player, or make any move that would distract him as he is about to deliver his bowl.

Last week we talked about Etiquette so this week I will tell you about Players and Their Duties.

The Skip shall have sole charge of his team and his instructions shall be obeyed by his players. The Skip should remember that the men on his team are as anxious to win as he is, and it is bad form to remind any of them that a bad bowl has been played.

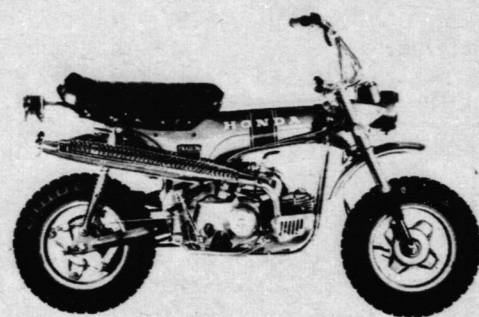
Remember also that all bowlers (including skips) play bad bowls at times, and lose games too. A Skip should confer sometimes with his Third as to the shot he proposes to play. When on the mat the wise Skip will ask his Third for advice as to the position if the head has been altered since he

left it. The Third when necessary, should indicate the position of the bowls, and the Skip, rolling last in each end should see to it that the mat is removed to the bank.

The Third player has no right to tell the Skip what to do. He may advise him if the head has been altered after the Skip has left it, but he must not attempt to control his play. The etiquette in this case is to remain silent until the Skip

asks for advice. It is the Third's job to indicate to the Skip the result of the end by raising or lowering his right hand, showing with his fingers extended the number of shots for or against. The Second player shall keep a record of all shots, scored for and against his side. The Lead shall place the mat and shall roll the Jack, ensuring that the Jack, is properly centered before playing his first bowl.

RECREATION TIPS: Canadian Boating regulations require that a government approved life jacket be carried for each passenger aboard all power and sailboats.

The OPP strongly advises that some type of effective flotation aid should also be carried in non-powered boats such as skiffs and canoes. Small children and non-swimmers should wear life jackets at all times while on board a boat.

Powered boats 18 feet and under are also required to carry two paddles or two oars and oarlocks, whichever is most convenient for the boat in question, a bailing bucket or bilge pump and an approved fire extinguisher if the boat is equipped with an inboard engine or heating or cooking appliances that burn liquid or gaseous fuels.

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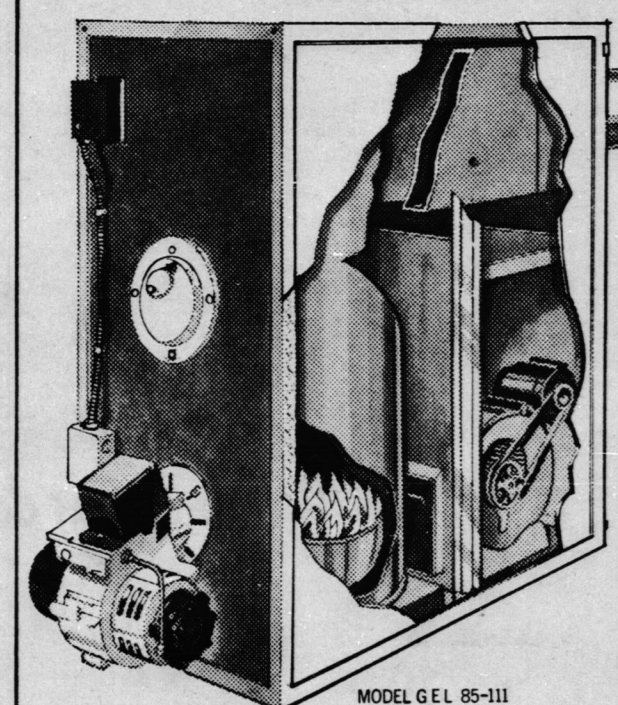
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
