approval to provide instruction for a pupil who is hard of hearing in the Hamilton School System.

The board had received a complimentary letter on the work of some Dunnville Secondary School students who had spent a week at a Pioneer Camp in preparing the Camp for summer occupancy. The work of the students had been in the area of the trades which they had been studying at school.

The property committee reported that the winter works program has been completed to the board's satisfaction. This has provided winter employment for several people who otherwise would not have been employed. One of the requirements of the program was that it be of a high labor content.

On this condition the federal and provincial governments shared almost the entire costs. The committee recommended resurfacing of certain asphalt areas at Rainham Central, J. L. Mitchener, and Haldimand Schools.

Roof repairs are being undertaken at the J. L. Mitchener, Northview, Hagersville Secondary and Caledonia High Schools. An Opportunity for Youth Program involving use of a portion of the Cayuga Secondary School has been approved by the federal government. Miss Jillian Abercrombie is the co-ordinator for this program.

The policy committee had been discussing a new course which is being suggested by the Ministry of Education. Jim Clemens, consultant with the Ministry of Education had presented some background for the course in World Religion.

This course is not to be considered a religious course but one which helps mature students - Grade 11 and 12 - to receive a better understanding of some aspects of life in other parts of the world. No attempt is made in the course to compare religions or to evaluate them.

However, the course does aim to aid students in becoming tolerant of other peoples' views and acquire a greater understanding of the thought process in other situations.

The board showed interest in the guideline and encouraged the administration to have a course designed for presentation to the board. It was voted such a course would possibly not fit into any single department of the secondary school, but rather draw resources from various areas of study such as literature, art, history, as well as others.

The chairman of the transportation committee reported changes have been worked out for Walpole South, Seneca Unity and Grandview School areas. Details have been passed on to the operators and the schools.

The committee is confident that the new system will give better service to the pupils in these areas as well as minimizing supervision by teaching staff at these schools.

Pupils in these areas should be ready at the bus stops a little earlier during the first few days of school in September. After several days the new system should be on a reliable schedule.

It was reported that 2,065 students, as well as 353 adults attended the Picasso Art Show in Dunnville recently. It was further drawn to the attention of the board that the Hagersville Secondary School Band will shortly leave on its European tour.

The Cayuga Secondary School Band is presently on a tour of performances in the Maritimes. These programs are self-sustained and not subsidized by the board.

 ncl members stressed the idea is currently in preliminary stages.

At present there are at least six different recreation boards operating under authorization from the municipality including the arena board, the athletic field board, the parks board, the community centre board, the swimming pool board and the recreation committee.

Hagersville saw its 1972 roads construction and maintenance program slashed in half by the ministry of transportation and communications. Approval for subsidies on construction was received for only \$9,500 of the \$20,000 requested by the town.

Subsidies for maintenance will total \$8,000 for the year bringing the total capital program for the year to \$35,000. No explanation for the cuts were given to council. The department pays for 50 per cent of the annual expenditure on road construction and maintenance.

Hagersville will look to the M.T. & C. for ratification of a proposed agreement between an engineering consulting firm and the town before signing the pact that would set fees for supervising roadwork on Highway 6 through Hagersville.

Deputy-revee Ross Slote told council he felt the agreement was unorthodox in that the town and not the department was being asked to sign for the fee schedule.

"I feel the department should see this first before we sign it. It is my understanding the province is paying for 100 per cent of the costs incurred during the project but I think they should see this first before we commit ourselves," he said.

Deputy-revee Slote chaired last night's meeting in the absence of Reeve John Kincaid. Council also approved the sale of provincial Kinsmen Club Lottery tickets within the municipality.

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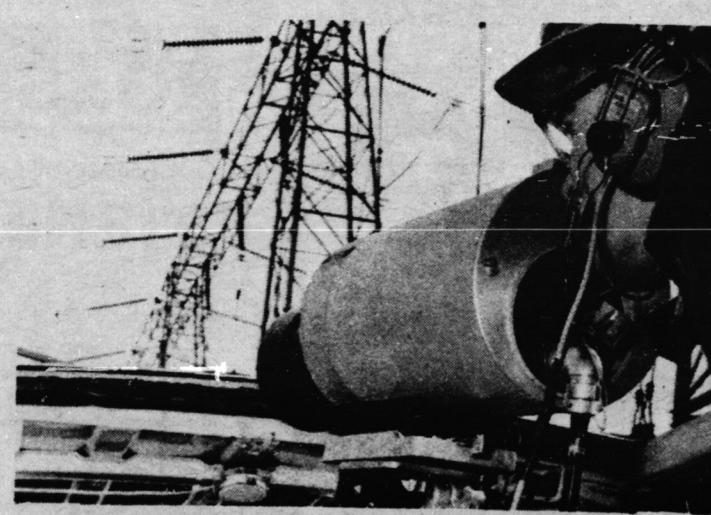
A military secret of two world wars is used by Ontario Hydro to spot weaknesses in its transmission systems.

Thermography - detection of objects by reading their heat with infrared sensors - wasn't released for non-military use until the 1950's. In wartime, infrared detectors located night-flying enemy planes and pinpointed troops on the ground. Civilian and industrial applications have grown to include medical diagnosis, searches for people lost at sea, early detection of forest fires, and industrial process supervision.

Hydro's technicians use the detector to locate faults in lines and switches carrying electric current. The infrared scanner creates an image, not from the visible part of the spectrum, but from heat radiation. A loose or corroded electrical connection becomes a hot spot which appears white on the scanner's television monitor, while warm areas are gray and cold areas black.

Preventive maintenance using infrared detection equipment allows faulty parts to be found and replaced before serious trouble develops.
