By the time you read this the finals will be in progress so get over to the tennis court and see some of the action.

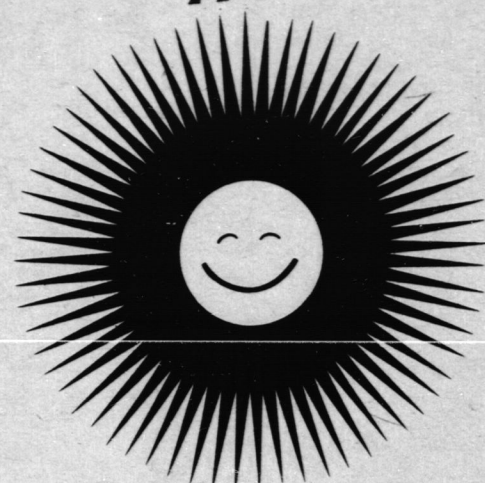
There are several young lads taking up the game and should give President Rick Webber some competition.

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Haldimand-Norfolk
Form New 'Warren'
Guide Division

As the result of recent studies, the former Haldimand Division plus Port Dover, Simcoe and Waterford now comprise the Warren Division of the Girl Guides of Canada.

According to a Girl Guide press release, in 1970 Woods-Gordon was authorized to study the provincial organization and they found decentralization most desirable for the girl, with emphasis on the local unit.

A report was made to the Ontario Provincial Executive and as a result Ontario is

now divided into 13 areas. Each area is sub-divided into divisions and each division further divided into districts.

The name, Warren, is taken from Glacial Lake Warren which left its mark on much of the countryside north of Lake Erie. L. J. Chapman and D. F. Putnam, in the Physiography of Southern Ontario record its "unmistakable occurrence" at Simcoe (Woodhouse, concessions 5, 6, lots 3 and 4) where its main characteristic, twin beaches is noted.

The deep varied silts of Ontario are mainly the deposits of Lake Warren, and are known now as Haldimand loam. These silts are responsible for the outstanding characteristics of the soils of the Haldimand region. Oneida clay loam, Haldimand clay loam, other gravelly loams on the old beaches, and the wet sandy loams of the Dunnville area are also mentioned. Deltaic sands near Dunnville are associated with Lake Warren.

Lake Warren drained by way of the Grand River Valley in post glacial times.

Glacial Lake Warren has left its mark on a large area north of Lake Erie.

Since it is associated by geographers with specific locations in the present counties of both Norfolk and Haldimand, and is attributed with being, in part, responsible for the basic characteristics of much of the soil conditions, it is suggested that Warren is a suitable name for the new division of the Girl Guides of Canada which now comprises these two counties.

Mrs. Watters congratulated the Jarvis group on raising a total of \$910.80. This was toward the objective by Norfolk of \$18,000 in the spring campaign. A total of \$19,600 was realized. Money is used for research, treatment, transportation drugs etc.
