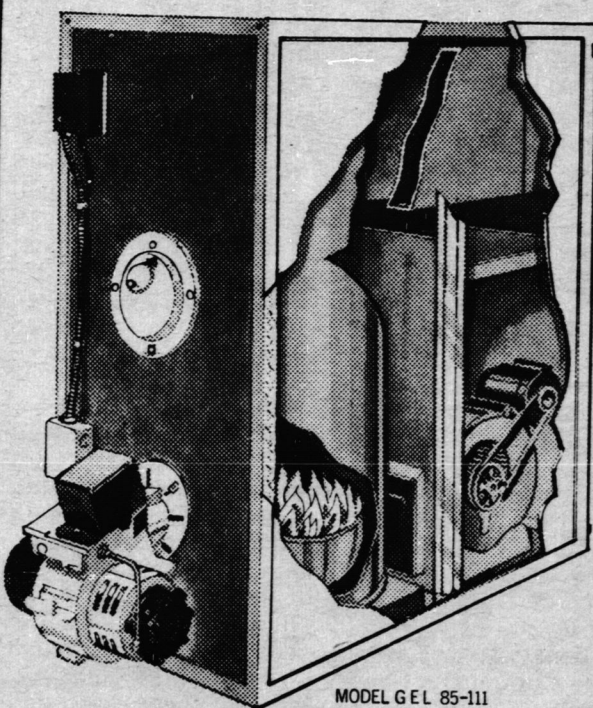

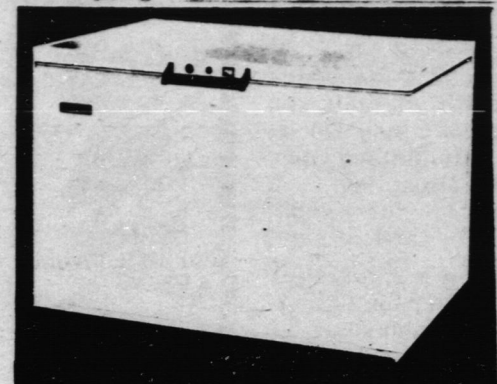
For travelling the bride wore a white pant suit with orchid corsage and red accessories. The honeymoon was to the Southern States.

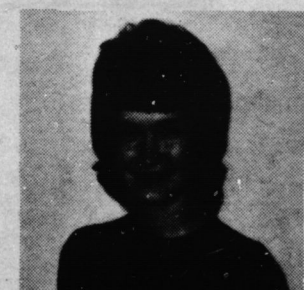
