PLAY-OFFS BEGIN

Finally, with 56 seconds remaining in the game, a shot by Larry Hill trickled in, off a Hawk skate, and

the victory was Smoothtown's. Both clubs played well and hard; the Bruins holding the edge in penalties 9 to 4 with Hagersville outshooting them 39 to 33.

With Bill Squires back this week from suspension, the Smoothtown club will be certainly stronger, but coach Lou Atkinson insists his club will win if they concentrate on playing hockey for the whole game.

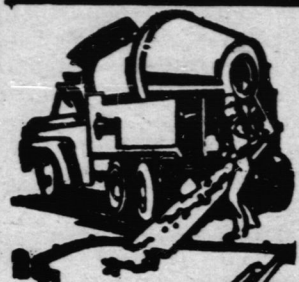

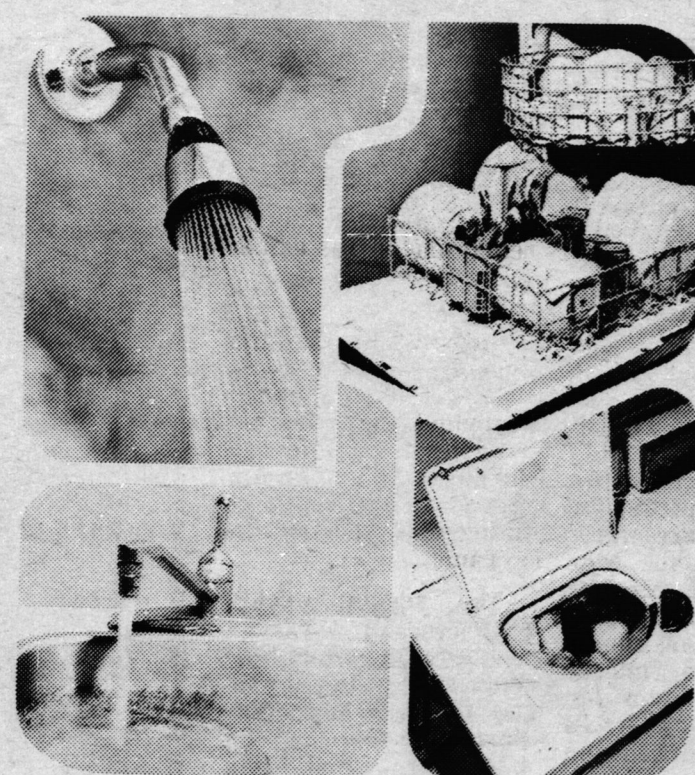

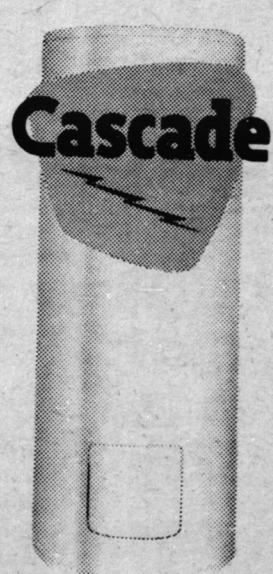

Highlights

Hydro Break Darkens Area

Parts of the Six Nations' Indian Reserve and the entire village of Hagersville were in darkness for nearly three hours on Monday night, Feb. 21.

A low tension 27,000-volt hydro line shorted out, and caused the mishap at 9:30 p.m. A cracked insulator was blamed by Ontario Hydro officials for the inconvenience. Rain, wind, and freezing weather caused the in-

sulator to crack, allowing the wire to come in contact with the pole, thereby setting it aflame.

The failure occurred with a flash, which many residents witnessed, and described like a terrific lightning storm. Power was cut to the southern part of the reserve, as well as the entire village being darkened.

Electrical service to the northeast and the central section of town was restored prior to the remainder of the affected area. Ontario Provincial Police moved in to assist patrolling the darkened village, and help with traffic control during the blackout.

Hoss Party At Legion

There were 20 tables of Hoss players at the Legion auditorium on Feb. 26. This was the second in a series of card parties, with all proceeds being given to charitable organizations.
