CABBERRA (Reuter) Australia and Poland have decided to establish full diplomatic relations, says Nigel Bowen, Australian external affairs minister. Bowen issued the text of a joint Australian-Polish communique Sunday which said both countries will set up embassies.

Six consulting firms have been engaged by the department, and they are working on preliminary proposals for the eventual use of the 98-acre parcel of land surrounded by the city of Brantford, he said. One Indian councillor, called this land the only \$5 million cornfield in Canada, which ignited a controversy on the

reserve last month, when it was learned that the city has plans to run a four-lane expressway across part of the land.

It was stated by one councillor that the Indians will not tolerate the loss of any more land. Several others demanded more consultation with the city planning officials, before making up their minds about the matter.

Mr. Barton said the consulting firms' pro-

posals would be submitted to council for approval, and then one of the firms would be selected to launch a full-scale planning study of the entire area.

In other business, council was informed that tenders will be let immediately for expansion and improvements to the Ohsweken water system. Estimated costs of the improvements are about \$30,000.

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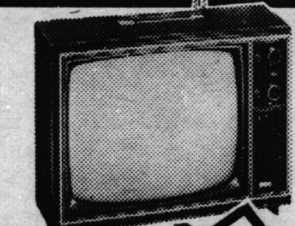

headed north across the lake and came down on a road near Port Dover.

Then he ran into Canadian aviation laws, which do not permit taking off from a road.

The Ontario Provincial Police were sympathetic about his predicament, but were not able to allow him to take off, under the provisions of Bill 72, which states that under no circumstances can a plane take off from a roadway.

Mr. Bowman was granted a 30-day visitors visa and said his only alternative was to take off from a nearby farmer's field.

He was assisted in his efforts by two Simcoe pilots, Ted Frost and Howard Keller.

He was finally able to take off Friday and returned to Latrobe airport, where he was met by his wife and then went straight to work at the Latrobe Die Casting Co.

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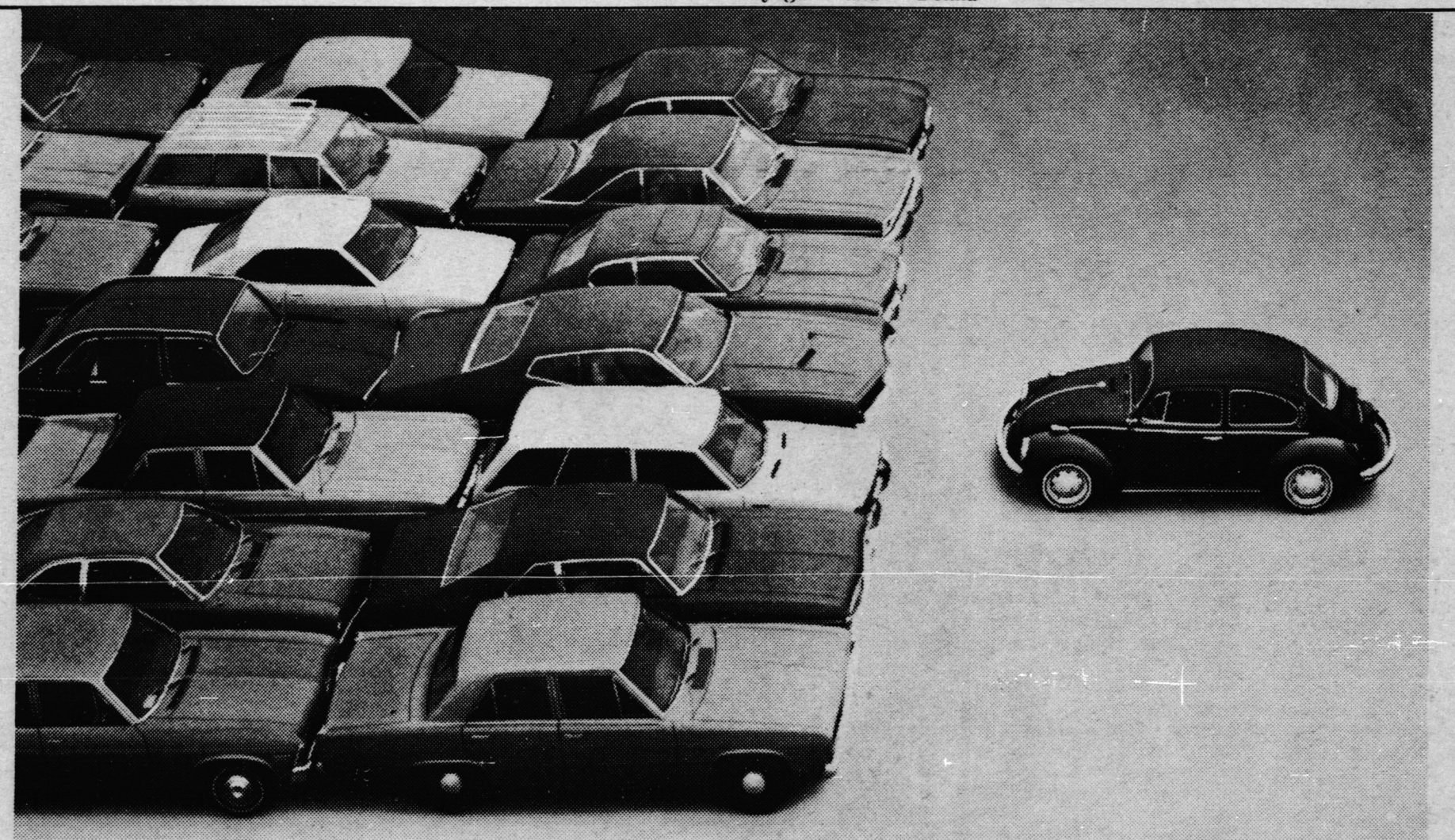
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
