notified that the land owners had sold to the OWRC. Council in turn said that no part of the land could be sold without going through a severance procedure.

Later in January council was told by the OWRC that as a Crown agency it did not have to involve itself in such municipal practices.

The OWRC, however, also has the right to expropriate land and will apply those regulations to the land in question.

This means that if objections are raised, the matter can be taken before the Ontario Municipal Board for a public hearing. In this case there is no public objection.

"This clears the whole matter up," said Clerk Dave Wilson. "If they had done this in the first place, it would have been quite in order."

Another matter was also cleared up at Friday's meeting, this time dealing with Ontario Hydro.

Hydro, in setting up the bases for a new tower line, had come too close to two township roads. Council had asked Hydro to set the tower bases back to the required 133 feet.

In a letter from E. M. Wadge, project engineer, council was assured that all tower lines, with the exception of one, will be maintained.

"SPIRITS OF THE DEAD"

McKeough Urges Region Formation

here, we are just as deadly serious. We took definite steps in the province today. It's a billion dollar investment."

Mr. McKeough said he was disappointed that the plans for Stelco had not developed as fast as anticipated. "However, the magnitude of what they propose is still all in line with what they talked about three years ago."

"Now we can't have this study going on forever. You have to make up your minds. I will accept a yes or no, but not a maybe."

"There are only three facts to be considered: One, there are too many municipalities and we need fewer. We all know this."

"Two, this isn't even an issue. The whole purpose of regional government is to bring back the municipalities into a unit."

"Three, this will put more power back in your hands and reduce the power of Queen's Park."

"We can't transfer our powers back to a very small municipality, but we can to a region."

"It is essential that what Mr. Richardson

has put in front of you are suggestions you have to act on. We want you to decide what you want. We want you to make up your minds."

Dr. Keith Mustard, deputy reeve of Dunnville, asked Mr. McKeough what "direction is the province going to give us regarding restructuring. I'm prepared to see a new form of government. But a lot feel we should go alone. Do you rule this out?"

"Yes," said Mr. McKeough. "It's not practical."

"Then what is the time limit," Dr. Mustard asked.

"I don't want to set a time limit," Mr. McKeough said, "but I'd like to see progress."

Reeve Gordon Miller, of Walpole Township, said he realized Norfolk "is interested in the assessment, but could we not maintain the centre of activity in this county? We are willing to work together in planning. We would try to go along with Norfolk. I think from an economic standpoint we should progress on a step by step basis."

Dr. William Austin, reeve of Jarvis, asked

Mr. McKeough if there are any chances of broadening the tax base under the regional government. The minister said there are some monies for specific purposes. There is a higher rate of unconditional grants, he said. "Those who take on larger responsibilities will get larger grants."

When asked if the two counties were to join together immediately, based on the premise Stelco will begin construction by 1975, would they have enough time to begin to cope with the planning that will be necessary, Mr. McKeough said "just."

He said a regional council should not look

for "miracles in the first couple of years. It just doesn't happen that quickly."

there was a nice crowd on hand to witness the game.

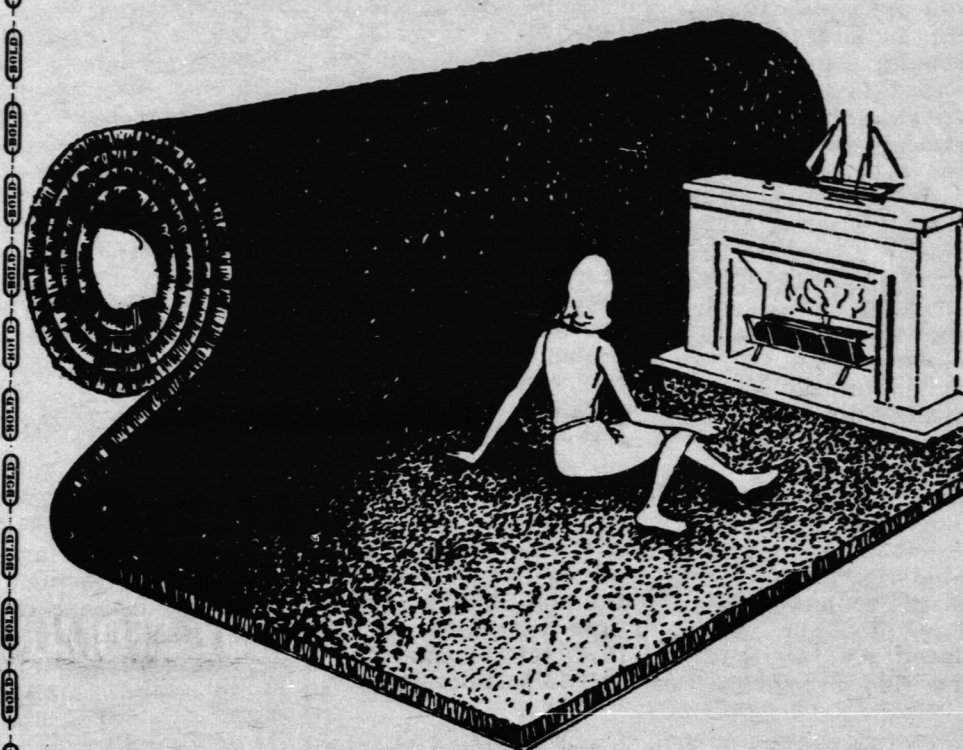
