### Garnet In Finals

Once again the overwhelming depth of the league champion Garnet Plowboys was in evidence, as they defeated the Flyers of Springvale 6-4, and assured themselves of a spot in the finals next week against either the Hagersville Hawks or the Smoothtown Bruins.

The Plowboys' Barry Miller opened the scoring assisted by bustling Paul Beischlag; then big Rick Hamilton picked up a loose puck and rammed it by Gil Martin to tie the contest as period one ended.

In the second stanza Paul Beischlag's efforts payed off again as he slid in alone to put Garnet in front at the 15:20 mark.

John Beischlag teamed up with young Bob Vermeulen as the period was closing to increase the Plowboy lead to 3-1. As the third period got underway, a solo dash by Stan Lofthouse and a fine scoring effort cut the margin to 3-2, before the roof fell in on the Flyers.

In rapid-fire fashion Barry Miller, John Porter and Bob Jepson blistered in shots past the busy Gary White. Although the Springvale crew came back in the final minute with scores from Gord Fearman and Cec Martin, the contest was out of reach and the valiant efforts by the Flyers ended their hockey season for this year.

With a week to rest up, the potent Garnet offence should be in good shape for the finals beginning March 14. As usual it will be the best three out of five series.

India's commercial walnut crop at 16,500 tons is 50 per cent above the previous year.  
Sugarcane growers in Yugoslavia received better prices in 1971. 0.22 dinars per kilo (\$14.67 per ton). The previous price was \$12 per ton.

The European apple crop decreased by 13 per cent. Brazil for the third year has a record soybean crop. Plantings were 3.3 million acres, up 13 per cent.

Beekeepers in Alberta produced 20.2 million pounds of honey. This was 39.6 per cent of the Canadian total. A 435-foot dam rising at Pong India is expected to bring 4.54 million acres of land into production of food worth 120 million a year. The dam is expected to be finished in 1973, at a cost of \$253 million.

New Zealand meat exports to the U.S.A. rose 25 per cent to a value of \$126 million. The production of cotton in Australia was down 22 per cent due to heavy rains and flooding in the Namoi river valley.

South Africa had good crops of corn and grain sorgham. They were principally responsible for a five per cent increase in that country's production.

Tunisia had the best olive crop since 1964 and the largest wheat crop since 1965.

Britain had its largest grain crop ever.

The chairman was Dr. N. Huschilt who introduced the guest speaker, Dr. P. Lyonds of Cayuga, assisted by Dr. R. Weylie, showed slides on the oil production in Libya. Dr. Lyonds has worked for the Esso Oil Company in Libya for a few years. He described how oil was produced at 17,500 barrels per day. Along with the oil came natural gas and water.

Now the water would be of enormous benefit for crops in the desert, except the water is too salty. The natural gas used to be burned off, but now it is liquefied and sold to countries such as Italy and Spain.

The natural gas is used by simple reheating in the country to which it is delivered. He also told the Knights of Columbus the people's customs in Libya.

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## HAGERSVILLE Highlights

### Ceremony Marks Opening Of St. Andrew's Addition

**HAGERSVILLE** - On Sunday Feb. 27 a large number of people gathered at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church for the official opening of a new addition to the Church edifice, consisting of a hall, kitchen and washrooms.

The moderator of Hamilton Presbytery, Rev. Trevor Lewis, Waterdown, and members of the Kirk Session, the Board of managers, building committee, the contractors, and planning engineer also neighboring clergy and church choir assembled in the church basement to proceed into the new building.

The moderator and the minister of St. Andrew's, Rev. Adam Thomson, led the procession to the front door of the building where the moderator knocked three times. The door was opened from within by the chairman of the building committee, Clifford Yule, who led the procession into the almost filled hall.

Following the prayer of invocation and the hymn Ye Gates Lift up Your Heads on High, Mr. Yule introduced the visitors taking part and welcomed them.

The Scripture lesson was read by the minister and the choir sang the anthem entitled My God and My All.

The Chairman of the Board of Managers, A.C. Smith, then narrated the steps leading to the construction of the building. He pointed out the imperative need over the years for a kitchen and suitable meeting rooms for the Sunday School, and the various church groups and paid tribute to the planning engineer James Hood for his work in drawing up several plans.

Finally a plan was decided upon and approved by the Presbytery of Hamilton and the Church committee on architecture in Toronto.

A sod turning ceremony was held in May last year and the building work began the following month by Faxon Bros., Hagersville. Many sub-contractors were also engaged, a list of which appeared in the program.

Mr. Smith thanked all who had contributed to the scheme. The planning engineer made a speech and handed over the keys of the new building to the oldest trustee, A. Hodgson, who mentioned his pleasure in receiving the keys on behalf of the congregation of St. Andrew's.

The moderator then proceeded by words and prayer to set apart the new building for the use of the Sunday School and the various church groups and also recreational purposes for young and old and also declared the building opened.

The Choir rendered the anthem entitled All Glory Land and Honor. The minister then welcomed the reeve of Hagersville, Jack Kincaid, who conveyed greetings and good wishes on behalf of the council and Hagersville.

Greetings were also conveyed by the following members of clergy, Rev. Martin Rule, Hagersville United Church; Rev. Don Eustace, All Saints Anglican; Father Raymond on behalf of St. Mary's and Norman Crawford, representing the Baptist Church.

The minister thanked all who had taken part including the organist, Miss Harper, for rendering such fine music on a special electronic organ, loaned and placed for the occasion by Cuiver Appliances, Hagersville.

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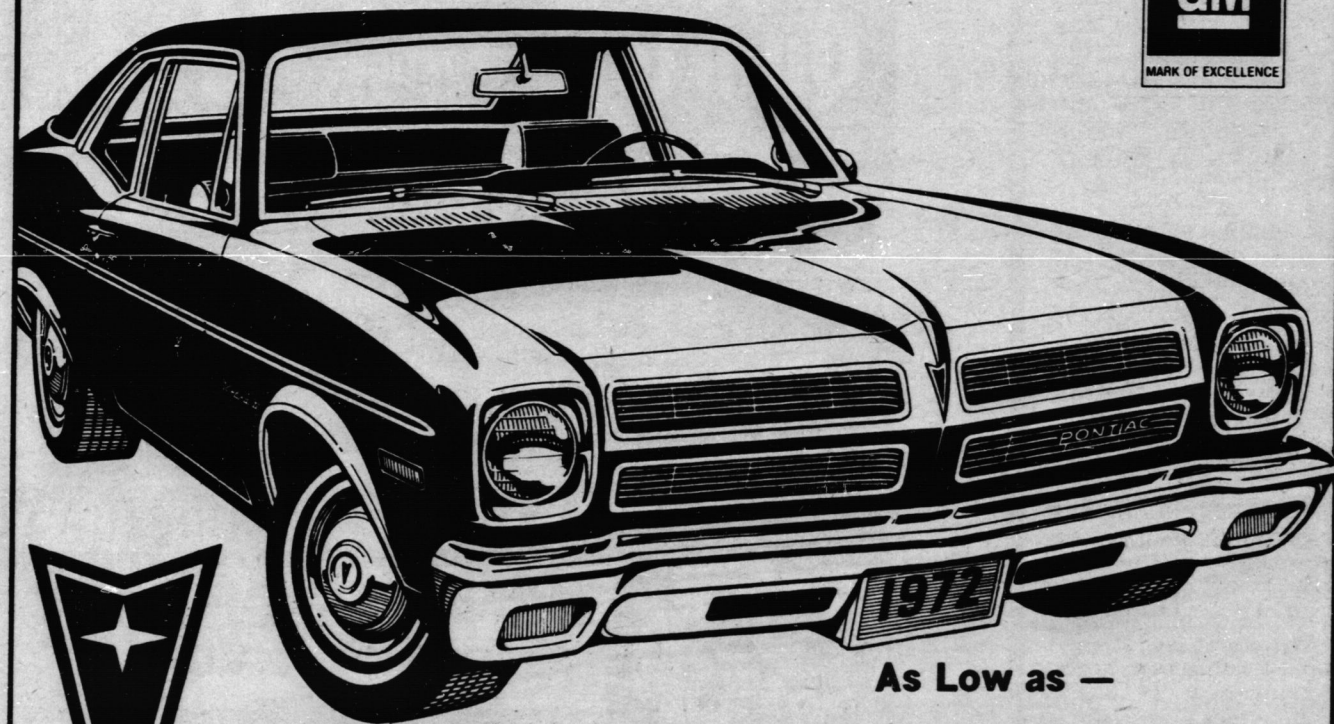
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
