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apartments in the village and attract possible welfare recipients to the area. Reeve Austin said the village could decide on which type of housing it required and avoid such a situation.

A building permit was issued at last night's meeting to the Jarvis Hotel for an addition to the rear of the existing building to provide washrooms and cooler space for the business. Conditional to the permit is a requirement for the owners to remove a garage at the back of the property to retain an adequate number of parking spaces.

Council received the 1972 levy from the Long Point Region Conservation Authority of 1 mill for the period. At least two councillors objected to the levy since "little of the money if any" is spent in Jarvis or Haldimand County by the LPRCA. Coun. Jim Davidson explained that land expenditures within the county are too expensive for most Authority projects.

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Emergency Measures Organization in the area will be utilized by the police force to assist existing officers on patrol when required.

Council voted unanimous support for the resolution calling for the added constable.

Reports for overtime hours will be submitted by the police chief of the Hagersville department to account for any overtime hours. Clerk Art Roth told council a record of the hours must be submitted before payments could be made.

Council decided at Monday night's session to schedule a full-scale meeting with the Ontario Water Resources Commission over ownership and operation of the town's sewage treatment plant. The OWRC has indicated it would be willing to take over management of the plant and has asked for council's comments on the issue.

A meeting is to be held, probably by the end of the month, and according to the consensus at the council, a number of questions remain unanswered on the issue. Employees at the plant would be under the supervision of the OWRC.

The Hagersville plant is being used by the OWRC as a pilot plant for phosphorous removal and equipment in the plant would probably be updated on an experimental basis under the project.

through a rear door and telephoned police from a neighbor's home.

As police arrived, a shot was fired through the glass of the bedroom window. Fragments of the bullet were found 15 feet from Caledonia Police Chief Alex Hendry's car.

Several of the man's relatives made attempts to talk him into giving up. He came out of the house, leaving behind two rifles after his brother talked to him at 4 a.m.

The six members of the Caledonia force were helped by six from the Cayuga OPP detachment and four from the Burlington OPP headquarters.

Police seized a 308 calibre rifle and a .22 calibre semi-automatic rifle. All shots had been fired from the .308 rifle, according to Sergeant Grant Ashbaugh, of the Caledonia police.

The man was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Hamilton for a psychiatric examination, then transferred to Cayuga jail.

2. Stir in sugar.
3. Add frozen concentrate and stir until melted. Stir in ice water.
4. Pour into individual dishes or 2-cup mold or bowl. Chill until set.

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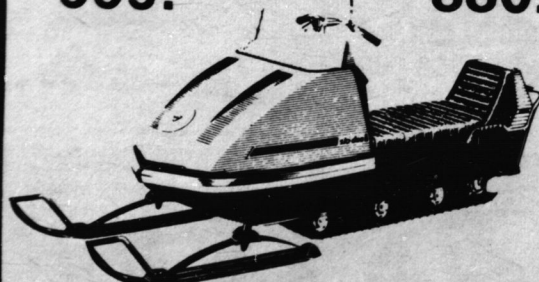
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SPORTS ROUNDUP

Jim Caudle proved too much for the Red Wings as he fired home three goals to pace a great come from behind win over the Wings. The Wings had led 2-0 at one

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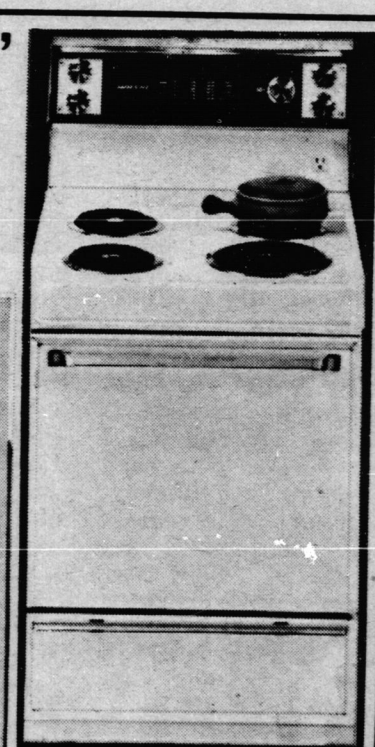
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
