and parts can not be put off much longer and how will farmers shop for their requirements will make a big difference on their net income for the year.

On many items the price may vary as much as 20 per cent. For example, farmers with expenses ordinarily mounting to \$15,000 by careful shopping could increase their net income by as much as \$3,000.
