"To say to the government 'you plan it' is a dereliction of duty. We must not allow our future to be charted in Toronto," Mr. Powell said.

Dr. Mustard, in seconding the motion, said he had been "bombed" on the pros and cons of regional government.

"no other recourse but to regional government." He said McKeough's statements had not been the final word on making up his mind but "I made it on the basis of Haldimand County. We have not grown to any great degree for a number of years. Our population of 30,000 does not give us the adequate structure to meet the rapid growth that is certain to take place.

"The cost to the taxpayer now is a lot more than 10 years ago and it will increase," he said. Dr. Mustard felt regional government could be operated on an economic basis.

The amendment was then introduced by Reeve Peirson, which stated only that the joint study committee report would be accepted.

Reeve of Jarvis, Dr. William Austin said he "represented the majority feeling in the village and had to go along with the LOIS report (a report commissioned by the Haldimand - Norfolk Study). He said the LOIS report shows the majority of people do not favor regional government.

"If the province wants to force regional government on us, let them. I see no reason why we must concur

with them," he said. Reeve Gordon Miller of Walpole, said he was not against regional government but "I am concerned about the costs. There has been no indication that taxes haven't gone up in areas where regional government has been implemented. It must be at a price we can afford.

"I think Stelco said it would be 1975 before it started work at Nanticoke, but it could be 1980 before it starts. We have no real assurance work will start in 1975.

"My concern is for the homeowner and the farmer. Our area is predominately rural.
