## On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association activity for 1972 will include High Yield Competitions in wheat, oats, barley, corn and soybeans. Cost studies will also be made on these crops. Notice of these programs will be forwarded to the 174 members of the association soon. Others are invited to enquire for information.

A new activity of the organization this year will be rain recording. Directors have noted the differences that occur across the county and the results of similar projects in Brant and Norfolk.



The Haldimand directors wish to know how much variation occurs in the county and where. Cooperators in the rain recording project would be welcome.

Corn Night is planned for Monday, April 17, 1972, at Cowan Farm Supply, Dunnville. This annual spring event marks the beginning of the high yield corn competition conducted jointly by Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association and the Dunnville Chamber of Commerce. Program details will be announced soon.

Application of fertilizer according to a soil test will cost the least or pay the most. Soil samples are tested free of charge by the Soils Laboratory at the University of Guelph in cooperation with the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. The testing procedure requires some time so two weeks should be allowed. It could require slightly longer during the spring rush.

There could still be time for a soil test for your spring crop.

Recent advice from the Ontario Milk Marketing Board about basic herd indicates that application forms are available at the District Taxation Office. Staff at the Extension Branch office have recently had the opportunity to discuss basic herd applications with a number of dairymen.
