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O.F.A. directors have supported a resolution endorsing a corn marketing plan. Kent County Federation has given this matter a great deal of study, and has come up with three alternative

plans. Other counties are also looking for a better way of marketing. O.F.A. will be calling a meeting to which county federations will be requested to send their recommendation to the corn council. The corn council then would make an official presentation to Government.

The shortage of storage and drying facilities at harvest time in particular has made orderly marketing difficult, which in turn weakens prices. This has been a big but not the only problem facing the corn industry.

The federal government has announced a program that will allow grain producers to depreciate now drying equipment and storage facilities in four years, if acquired between April 1, 1972 and August 1, 1974.

If farmers make use of the provincial government's 40% capital grant program, combined with the new depreciation rates, farm storage could be very economical. Corn marketed throughout the year could be a start towards more orderly marketing.

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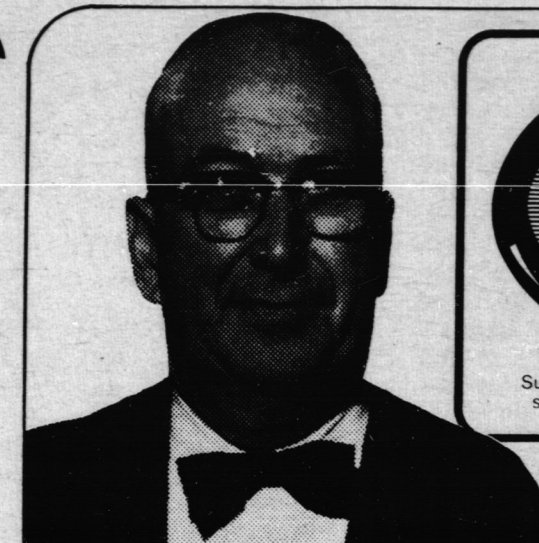
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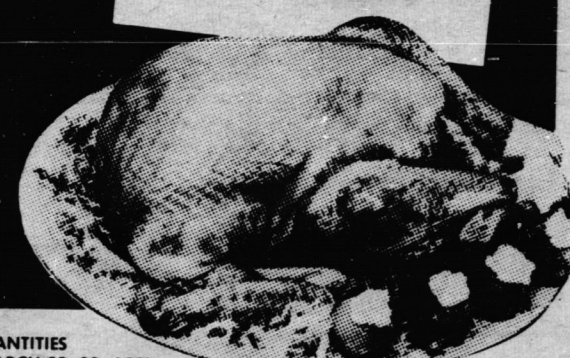
