

Robert Doughty Heads Jarvis Community Chest

Robert Doughty, of Nanticoke, was elected president of the Jarvis District Community Chest campaign, which gets underway May 15, and runs to May 27 at the annual organizational meeting April 27 at the United Church. The campaign objective this year is \$2,800.

Earl Slater, of Jarvis,

was elected as vice-president and was also named campaign chairman. Mrs. Clifford McBride is secretary and Edward Stire, of Walpole St., Jarvis, is treasurer. Mrs. R.A. Miller is press reporter.

The elections were chaired by Ralph Gowan with secretary Ruby McBride.

The treasurer's report from 1971, prepared by last year's treasurer Rev. K. N. Brueton, was accepted. Collections showed \$2,830. Less expenses, the amount remitted to specified charities was \$2,734.73. The bank balance was \$40 and the special account from former years

showed \$400 for local emergencies.

Representatives at the meeting were from area lodges, churches and the Lions Club.

Mrs. Miller is to arrange for canvassers in Jarvis and order receipt cards. All donations are to be turned in by collectors to Mr. Stire.

The charities in this year's campaign are: Adult Opportunity Centre, Haldimand; Canadian Arthritic and Rheumatism Society; Mental Health Association; Institute for the Blind; Salvation Army; Red Cross; Rehabilitation or March of Dimes; Retarded Children's Fund; Canadian

Diabetic Society; Heart Fund and the St. John Ambulance Association.

The Adult Opportunity Centre in Haldimand replaces the West Haldimand Hospital at Hagersville on the campaign.

Mrs. Miller reported that 18 collectors are already lined up to canvas in Jarvis.

Norfolk-Haldimand Study Receives Forty Submissions

Forty submissions have been received by the Haldimand-Norfolk Study as of May 1, the extended date for the submission, Eric Grove, assistant director of the study said Tuesday.

Area municipalities and citizen groups have been asked by study director Nigel Richardson to submit briefs on his interim report Towards A New System of Local Government by April 14. However, the deadline was extended for municipalities unable to make a submission by that time.

Mr. Grove said there was a "slight preponderance in favor of Haldimand" in the number of reports submitted.

The reports will now be reviewed by a com-

mittee, including Mr. Richardson and Mr. Grove. Mr. Grove said the various reports will be subjected to a "mechanical analysis" which will break all the reports down into similar points. Then the analysis will be subjected to refinements and then weighed as to their desirability in both short and long term planning for the two county area.

Mr. Grove said the presentation of the initial results of the submissions will likely be presented to the public in a draft report form in about six weeks.

In the meantime, Haldimand County Council has yet to hear from Ontario Treasurer and Municipal Affairs

Minister Darcy McKeough on the status of the county's resolution to postpone regional government with Norfolk until the Steel Company of Canada starts construction at Nanticoke.

County council has set up a committee to try and restructure the internal boundary lines to form fewer municipalities.

Warden John McCombs urged the committee at last month's county council meeting to "do some restructuring and bring back recommendations to council so we know where we're going."

He said he had been in the dark as to what direction the county was taking since it had voted to postpone regional government in March.


Committee member Gordon Miller, Reeve of Walpole Township, said the committee had met once since last month's county council meeting and would be meeting again before May's meeting.

He said the committee is working towards a report on restructuring within the county and would be submitting a report to county council.

"They may accept the report then," he said, "or they may want us to continue the study further."

Haldimand's stand on restructuring does not follow Mr. McKeough's urging to form regional government with Norfolk. Mr. McKeough has said regional government could be implemented in the area by Jan. 1, 1974.

Norfolk county council has endorsed the idea of a two-tier regional structure with Haldimand.

First Full Power Test Achieved At Nanticoke

NANTICOKE - Ontario Hydro's newest generating station achieved its first full power test last week on its first generator, five weeks ahead of schedule.

The turbine generator system has been in the testing stage since first power was generated in January. The turbine generator was held at 500,000 kilowatts for just a few minutes, then reduced to a partial load to resume testing of auxiliary systems.

The testing will continue into the summer until the unit is commissioned as part of Hydro's generating capacity in the province.

The 500,000 kilowatt generator supplies enough electricity to supply all the electric needs of two cities the size of London.

The information centre at the plant also opened last week for its fourth season. During the past three years, more than 120,000 people have visited the centre.

The centre will be closed Tuesdays and Wednesdays this year. It is open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily for the remaining five days. Sunday operations will be similar to last

year, but instead of films, the guides will use a slide presentation to show the development of the plant from the start of construction to the operations of the equipment.

The visitor's tour of the information centre will be extended to the project Sunday afternoons. A bus will take the people

around the switchyard to the road west of the coal storage area, past the stacker-reclaimer, around the east end of the powerhouse to the dock area.

From the dock area, the bus will complete the circle route across the front of the project and back to the information centre. The whole tour lasts about 45 minutes.

Trout Fishing Season Opens: Reported Fair

With Haldimand lacking in trout streams, area anglers had to travel to Norfolk for the opening of the season on Saturday and the fishing was only reported as fair.

Chief Ranger Bob Ellah, of the Ministry of Natural Resources (formerly Department of Lands and Forests), in Simcoe, said the public fishing areas at Waterford, St. Williams and Normandale produced some good catches. He said he had not seen any large fish caught while on patrol on Saturday, although there were some trout caught between 12 and 14 inches, he said.

Mr. Ellah reported nine fish tags were returned at Waterford on Saturday. He said the tags are a good way of finding out how many fish are caught and it gives the office an indication of when fish in the pond should be restocked.

Mr. Ellah said there are no trout streams in Haldimand, although a few rainbow have been reported in the Grand River. However, there is a year-round season for pike and yellow pickerel and a few five and six pound pickerel were caught in the Grand River at Caledonia, he said.

Mr. Ellah noted the
