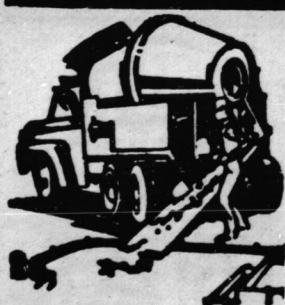

Watch Calcium Levels In Swine Rations

Calcium is one of the elements necessary for normal bone development. However, there can be problems if too much or too little calcium is used in swine diets, says Garnet Norrish, Swine Specialist, Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

When diets are too low in calcium, there is a danger of fractures to the legs or even the back. When there is too much calcium, 1.5 per cent or greater in the total ration of growing pigs, daily gains will be depressed and feed efficiency impaired.

Most of the calcium is usually supplied by concentrate or with a premix. Some of these premixes supply sufficient calcium while others do not. Some

producers who feel there is insufficient calcium in the feed will add ground limestone, as much as 25 pounds per ton of feed, in addition to the premix or concentrate.

Since ground limestone costs only about one cent per pound, there is always a temptation to add too much. If the diet is already correct for calcium, the addition of 25 pounds per ton of feed could do more harm than good, says Mr. Norrish.

When choosing the diet, the exact amount of calcium should be determined. And from this, the exact additional requirement

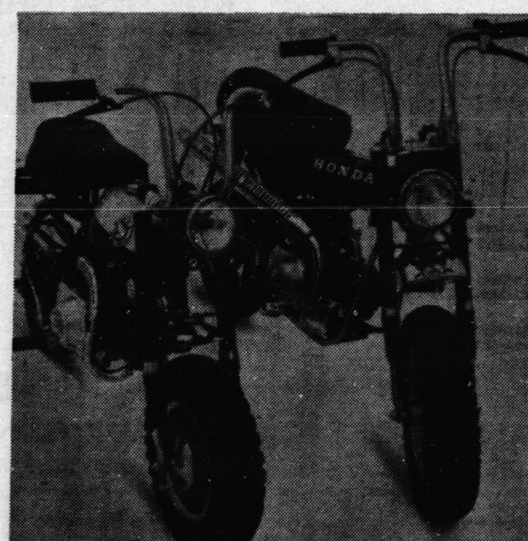

The message we get from the soybean evening is that if you are going to try soybeans it would be well to take some time to learn from those with experience about some of the problems with that crop. Additional information would be found in publication 296 1972 Field Crop Recommendations and in publication 75 - Chemical Weed Control. Both are available at the county agricultural office.

drainage after seeing the results.

Entry forms will be available at the marketing yard in Cayuga. A large number of entries is desired by the directors. Awards will be presented at the next annual meeting.

1972 Canfarm records, are well under way. Several Haldimand farmers have started on Canfarm for the first since January. This computerized farm record keeping system has gone through the growing pains that can be expected with a new system

of this sort. With most of the bugs now out of the system the routine accounts are now processed promptly and with little difficulty. Canfarm participants are also finding it easier to keep the accounts in order after experience for a year or two. Results of any record keeping system become more meaningful too when one year's records can be compared with another.

The dead elm that are still standing present a horrible appearance but more to the point, now that spring field work is upon us, they present a serious safety hazard. Farmers with a gross farm income of \$3,000 or more are eligible for a grant of \$5. per tree for removal of dead elm. A pre-cutting report is requested for grant purposes before removal of dead elm.

The April meeting of Selkirk Faith Centennial U.C.W. was held at the church on the evening of April 12.

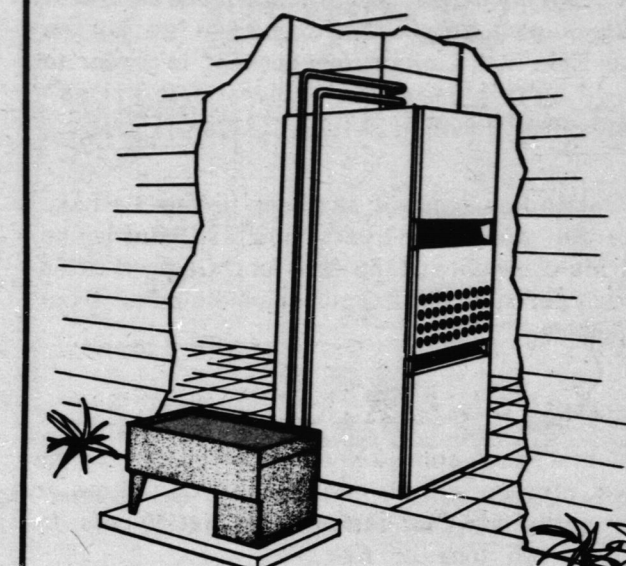
