

Lectern Bible Dedicated At St. Paul's

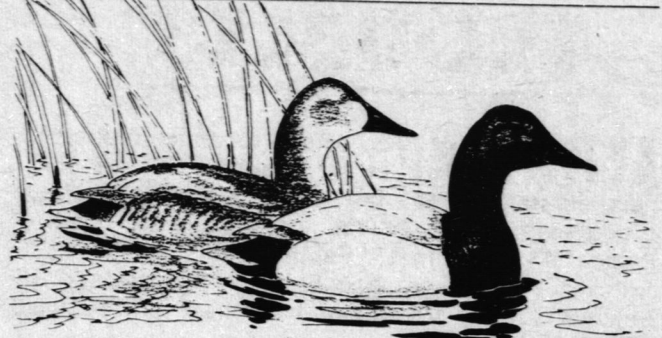

CANVASBACK

This big diving duck is found in the deep water of marshes and marshy edges of lakes as well as the deep prairie potholes. The wedge-shaped bill, merging into the forehead gives this duck a distinctive head outline. Canvasbacks obtain most of their food by diving and rooting in the bottom mud for succulent roots and tubers of aquatic plants. Sago pondweed on the prairies and wild celery in the east are favorite foods. The nest, nearly always built over water, is a sturdy, basket-like structure of woven reed stalks lined with finer material and securely attached to surrounding vegetation. Ten eggs are generally laid.

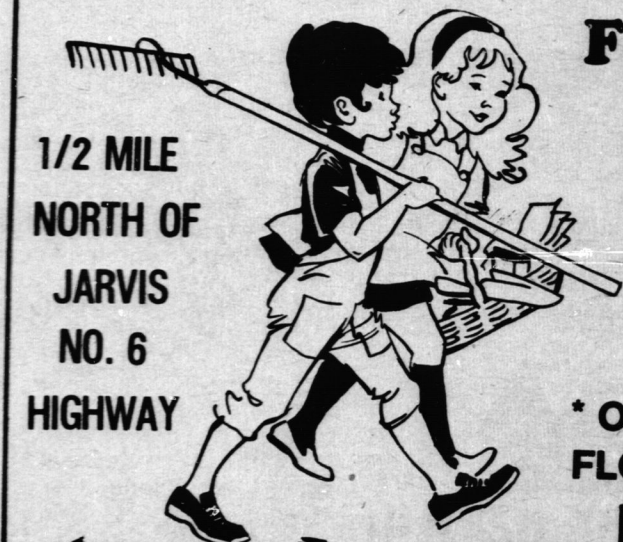

Churches Mark Mothers' Day Services

It's a Sunday. It's always is. It's May 14 this year. Through the years Mother's Day has come to be known also as Christian Family Sunday. The Christian mother likes to have her family with her... in Church. Among some of the old-fashioned customs is the custom of giving Mother a big hand Sunday morning so that the whole family can go together to church and worship together in the Sanctuary.

There's more than just sentiment involved here, although sentiment should be a very good reason all by itself for being in Church as a family. A young Irish clergyman in New York coined a phrase several years ago, 'The family that prays together stays together'. He must have hit the right nail on the head for he started a non-denominational order, the Christophers, which means the Christ-Bearers.

Every congregation will have its own way of observing Mother's Day. About 10 different denominations share in the planning of a printed order of service. This will probably be used by most local churches. In addition to the printed order there will be use of talents and other human resources to make the day meaningful.

Chalmers' Stone Church will be giving the regular 10 a.m. service largely into the hands of the teenagers, cancelling the school at 11 a.m. in the hope that parents and others will support their youth in the Christian Family Sunday Worship.

Knox Church, Jarvis is entertaining the 'Jarvis Jubilees' a group from the Christian Reformed Church, four young ladies and a man who harmonize beautifully in the inspirational Gospel Songs of today. This is scheduled at the regular 11 a.m. service May 14.

One of the significant events in both Chalmers' and Knox will be the sacrament of baptism for babies. Parents of little children mark Christian Family Sunday as a time to renew the covenant of faith for themselves and before God bring their children within the divine contract. "See that the little children come unto me and do not forbid them, for of such is the kingdom of heaven" (Jesus).

For this reason, many people who may have drifted away from regular attendance at their worship choose Mother's Day to make a come-back this grand old custom.

Hagersville Police Report

HAGERSVILLE - The department investigated five motor vehicle accidents involving property damage only; 27 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act; nine charges laid under the parking by-law.

The department investigated several occurrences involving theft, frauds, break and enters and stolen autos, with the result of persons arrested and charged. Thirteen charges were laid under Criminal Code and Liquor Control Act.

The members of the department investigated 217 general occurrences; served 12 summonses for other departments; assisted the OPP Cayuga detachment in three traffic occurrences; arrested two

persons for other offences; conducted seven investigations for other departments; six business premises were found insecure and two adults reported missing and found.

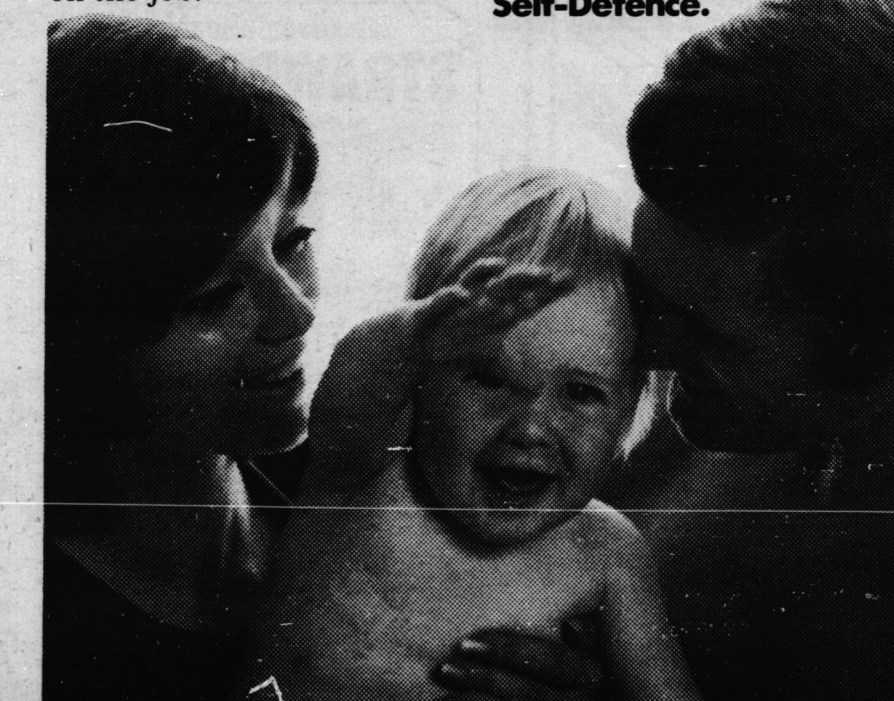
