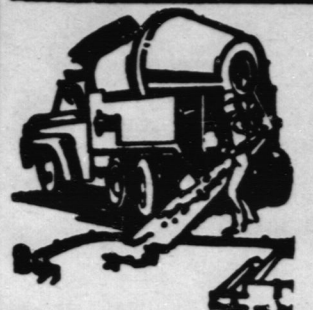

Guide Auxiliary Meets

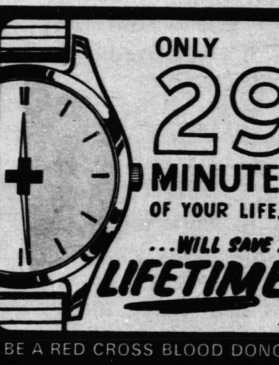

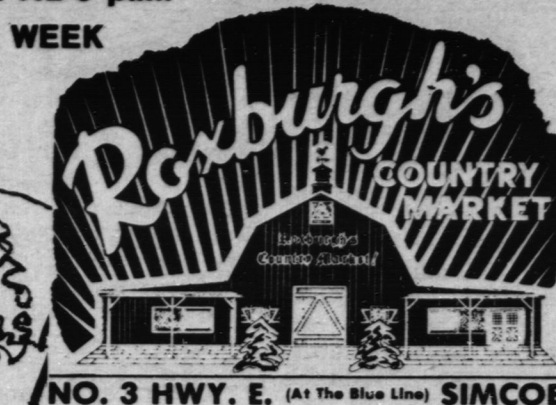

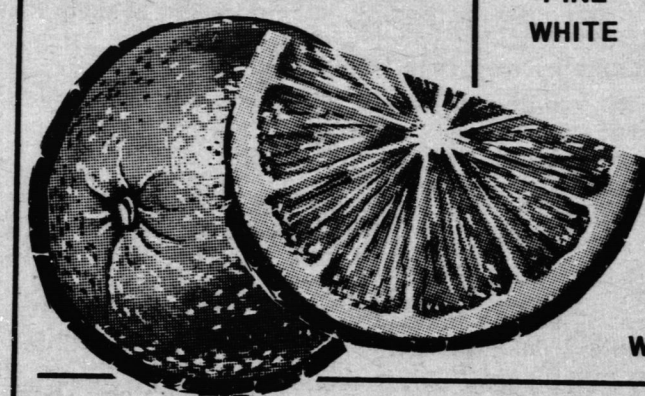
