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Federation Facts

A farmer faces more risks than most people. Accidental injury or sickness can seriously affect his work and livelihood. And there's always the risk of injury or property damage involving others. A salesman buyer or friend may be injured while visiting the farm. A farm animal might stray and damage someone else's property.

It also provides coverage for certain farm animals killed in a collision on public highway or railway right-of-way.

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On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - Canada Department of agriculture has announced a two-price wheat payment program for Ontario producers. Applications have been called for by May 10 from all eligible producers.

Those applying have been asked to show proof of eligibility by submitting a copy of the receipt for taxes or rent paid. Amount of payment will be based on the wheat actually used for domestic consumption in Eastern Canada.

According to the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board a maximum of 500 bushels or the equivalent of about \$500 per producer is involved.

Payment is to be calculated on the basis of past deliveries of wheat for domestic human consumption.

Application forms are to be forwarded to the Canada Department of Agriculture, Sir John Carling Building, Ottawa.

It's corn planting time according to the calendar and according to yield results of previous years. Those who are counting on the corn crop particularly for grain will be keeping this in mind as they decide which crop to plant first when seeding becomes possible.

Seeding date is important for the barley crop too. While it is not quite as critical with the oat crop, yield can be affected with a later seeding date also. The final decision on which to seed first will vary according to the importance of the different crops on individual farms.

A change in crop or manure application plans from that indicated when a soil sample was sent for testing would require a change in the fertilizer treatment to be made.

Many of the Haldimand farmers who have soil tested contact the county agriculture office for an adjusted fertilizer recommendation when such changes are necessary.

Soybean seed may be in short supply this spring. Those who have not made arrangements for their requirements are advised to check with their supplier.
