#### **Editorial Comment:**

#### **OFY Project Questioned**

The challenging in the House of Commons on Friday of an Opportunity for Youth grant by William Knowles, Norfolk-Haldimand MP, for a group of Simcoe youths brings to light the entire program once again.

Mr. Knowles asked, in the House, according to the Hansard report, if the government would 'investigate a grant of \$7,765." He said one of the objects of the project is the "publishing of an underground newspaper, a copy of which I have here, and the language is such that it could not be read in the House of Commons."

Mr. Knowles was apparently acting on information supplied by a resident of Simcoe, who had sent him a letter and a copy of the newspaper. The resident was questioning the validity of the project and the qualifications of the persons undertaking the project.

On Saturday, according to published reports, Mr. Knowles met with a spokeman and members of the HELP project and was assured that the money would not be used for publication of an underground newspaper or for drug use.

Mr. Knowles said afterwards that while he could not give full support to the project, he could give it his approval, with reservations.

The HELP project plans to operate a crisis intervention centre, which would work around the clock, seven days a week, as well as a dropin centre and a series of camping out expeditions for underprivileged children between the ages of nine and 14.

These projects appear guite noble in intent and as such merit consideration on the part of grant. This is the second year the HELP project has been undertaken. Last year the project was much more limited in scope and eventually floundered because of the lack of funds.

However, because this same group of young people are again trying to provide a service, which they feel is necessary, at least shows their intent to involve themselves in some meaningful social action.

It is incumbent upon the federal government, which is handing out the money, to investigate each of the applications for a youth grant. If the government finds itself understaffed, which is apparently the case in this incident in not being able to investigate projects, then it should perhaps curtail some of the vast sums of money being spent on the youth in Canada.

There is a very grave danger to these young people in having their project brought up before the House of Commons by an MP acting on the advice of a single citizen. If the project does not deserve government approval, then it should have been turned down before the grant was ann-

If the project, which is being investigated this week, does receive approval again, then it would be hoped the matter would be cleared up in the House to at least remove the inferences against this group of young people.

It would then be up to the HELP project organizers to prove to the society in which they are operating that they can undertake and manage their project successfully. This would be the only answer they would need as a reply to the individual who brought the question up in the first place.


