the meeting to review and study a draft bylaw restricting industrial waste to be discharged into the sanitary sewer system. The draft bylaw was received from B.W. Hansler, area operations engineer of plant operations of the Ministry of the Environment (formerly OWRC).

Mr. McMulkin recommended that at present kitchen garbage, ground through a kitchen garbage machine, should be restricted from entering the sanitary drain. He also felt the overflow of the swimming pool, the wading pools, water cooling air conditioners, water cooled ice machines and roof storm water emptying into the sanitary sewer system will tend to crowd the capacity of the sanitary sewer system.

He recommended the restraining order to empty storm water and kitchen garbage into the sewer system be entered in a bylaw separate from the industrial waste bylaw.

Hagersville is currently in the process of having the department of the environment take over the operation of the sewage treatment plant. A formal agreement from the department was received to enter the agreement to "operate, supervise, control, maintain, repair, administer and insure the sewage works of the village."

Copies of the agreement were forwarded to the village's solicitor and the engineer for their comments.

future producers obtaining a licence to grow corn. The commission would then have the power to recommend that certain people or companies have their licences revoked by the Farm Products Marketing Board. Most important, this commission would speak with authority to governments and to the trade for the Ontario corn grower.

Haldimand's approval of the principals of this plan resulted in the new formation of the Haldimand County Corn Growers Committee with Phillip Hare, R. R. 2 Nanticoke elected president; Otto Crone, R. R. 4 Hagersville elected vice-president and Roy Hagan, Jarvis elected secretary.

Beef Cattle Loans Help Industry - Hill

TORONTO - This new program of guaranteed bank loans for purchasing beef breeding stock will certainly help put the beef industry in Ontario on an equal footing with other provinces, Ontario Federation of Agriculture President, Gordon Hill said in Toronto Friday. "We have the land and we have the markets, and now we have the financing. The stage is set for a resurgence of beef production in Ontario."

Hill's comments followed last week's announcement by Agriculture Minister William

Stewart of government-guaranteed bank loans for the purchase of heifers for beef production. The maximum loan per head is \$250, maximum over-all loan is \$15,000.

Borrowers under the program will pay only interest for the first two years of the loan, and then repay interest and principle over the next five years.

"This program would have given the beef industry more of a boost if it had included the forgivable interest feature that we proposed," Hill said, "but perhaps the decision to bring new fences into the capital grants program will compensate for that to some extent."

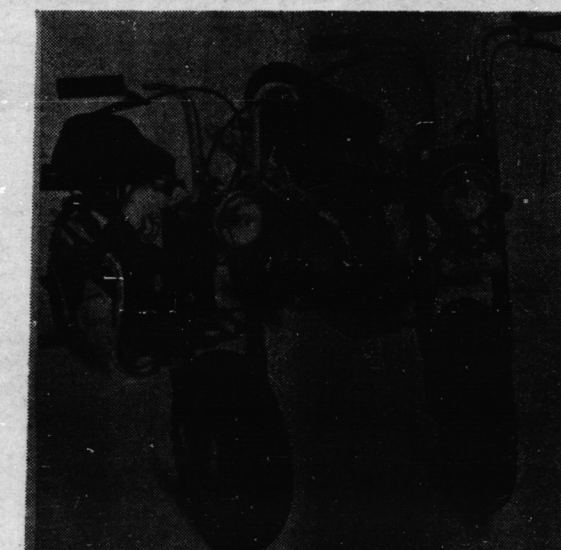

This made it necessary for girls to be trained in the house hold arts - cooking, sewing, cleaning and general housekeeping from early childhood. Upon marriage a young wife became part of her husband's family living with his people. Young people felt res-

ponsible for the care of older members of the family. Women rarely work outside the family. Visiting friends and neighbors was customary as well as courses in handicraft baking etc. Old and young mingle freely together. She spoke of the honor paid a newborn baby and the courtesy expected of children to their elders and the freedom with which the various ages spoke together, father being the head of the household. Her talk was much enjoyed. The West Haldimand President, Mrs. William Lamb was unable to be present as she has had a serious battle with the flu. Mrs. George Bassindale, District Secretary, expressed her pleasure at being present and stressed the importance of the project Knack with Knits just completed. Mrs. Leonard Church auctioned the cookie prize went to Mrs. Jack Brintnell. Mrs. Ted Harris moved the vote of thanks. The June meeting will be Health month. CAYUGA - On May 13 a Sherbrooke Township man was beaten in the Village of Stromness at 2.10 a.m. and robbed of \$20. after being knocked down and kicked by his assailants. On May 14 charges of robbery with violence were laid against two Dunnville youths and one girl, along with another youth from the Toronto area.

Six thefts were reported amounting to \$575. Four reports of malicious damage were investigated along with three break and enters. Two assaults were investigated, one charge under the Liquor Control Act, one man charged with impaired driving.

During this period, two cars were stolen from Haldimand County, both of which were recovered in Tuscarora Township, Brant County, one of which was completely burned.
