

Nanticoke CGIT Hosts Mother-Daughter Banquet

Another great year for the 25 members of the Nanticoke C.G.I.T. was concluded Monday May 8, with the annual Mother and Daughter banquet. The buffet dinner was prepared by the leaders, girls and mothers and served by six ladies of the Anglican and United churches.

The president, Debbie Vokes, welcomed the mothers and other guests and proposed the toast to the Queen. Kathy Meade proposed the toast to the mothers and Mrs. M. Hladys responded. Between courses and after dinner, hearty sing-songs were enjoyed from song

sheets prepared by Nancy Meade.

Susan Lindsay introduced the headtable guests, who were, the president and her mother, Mrs. Robert Vokes, Mrs. Harry Kleinhuis, the speaker of the evening, Mrs. John Lindsay, U.C.W. representative, Mrs. Wayne Lindsay, president of the A.C.W., Mrs. Arnold Creaser, wife of the United Church minister, Kathryn Field, who had assisted with macrame, and Elsie Doughty, superintendent of C.G.I.T.

In her address, Mrs. Kleinhuis, whose husband is now minister of the Baptist Church in Selkirk, told of their

experiences during the two years of their stay at St. John's School of Alberta. This school, as well as St. John's of Selkirk, Manitoba, was originated by two Anglican clergymen a few years ago, but is now independent as a private school for boys.

At this school the boys are given rigorous training in physical endurance including long canoe trips following the actual routes taken by fur traders, and snow-shoe hikes of 50 miles in one day. As well, the students share the routine tasks of house-keeping, garbage collection, bee-keeping etc. and must attain academic standing to the best of their ability.

Cheryl Smith thanked the speaker and presented her with a token of appreciation.

After Sharon Field played an accordion solo, Karen Hobbs gave a summary of the activities of the year. As well as the weekly meetings, there was a pot-luck supper to begin the season last fall; the Christmas Vesper service for the community; carolling throughout the village followed by a party at Debbie and Julie Vokes' a trip to the Sherway Plaza and on to the Ice Folies; a Niagara

district day-long rally at Port Colborne; a visit to Johnson's Nursing Home in Port Dover when the patients were entertained with songs, cookies and euchre and after which the girls went bowling; a Whatsit Sale and finally the banquet.

Madeline Thomson, the junior leader, presented World Friendship badges to the first-year girls indicating their participation in the mission study, which this year was about Africa.

Each of the three groups then entertained with nonsensical skits before concluding with the serious ceremony of graduation. The graduating senior, Debbie Vokes, took her place beside the worship centre and Elsie Doughty read the prayer and scripture. The senior leader, Helen Snowden, outlined the organization of the group in February 1949 and how it has been in operation continuously ever since.

She then followed the theme, "To-day we'll lived makes every yes-

terday a dream of happiness and every tomorrow a vision of hope." In her valedictory, Debbie said how she valued her five years with C.G.I.T. and had adopted its purpose as her own. She was then presented with the pin and graduation certificate.
