Changes in the Capital Grant Program and a Beef Heifer Loan Program have been announced. Loans of up to \$15,000 for purchase of bred or open beef heifers will be available. This program is also supported with the addition of

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permanent livestock fencing to the farm projects eligible for capital grant. Also announced is the deletion of woodlot elm from the capital grant program. As of May 19, the capital grant payment of \$5. per tree will apply only to dead and diseased elm trees located on fence lines and in open fields. Capital Grants, including those for cutting of dead elm, continue to apply to farms with a gross income of \$3,000 or more.

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
