Ed Miller and Roy Doughty have been reported as being confined to hospital. Our sincerest wish is that they will soon fully recover and enjoy good health again.

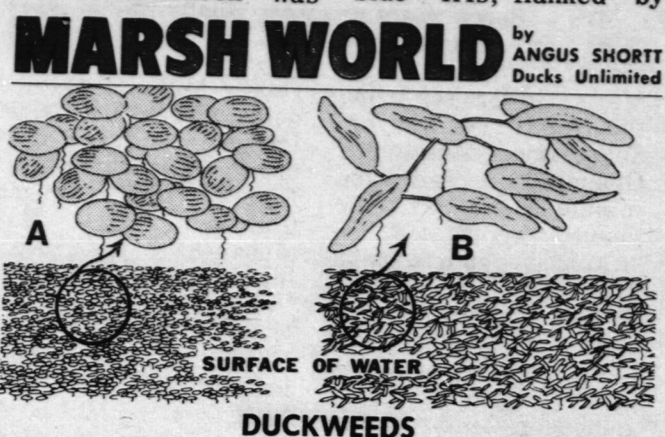
Nelles Corners WI

Minute floating plants commonly found in calm water areas of marshes, sloughs and potholes. They grow in dense mats, often covering the entire surface. Two kinds are illustrated, A — Lesser duckweed (Lemna minor) this tiny plant is disc-shaped and averages only about one-eighth of an inch long, each with a fine thread-like root. B — Ivy-leaved duckweed (Lemna trisulca) has oblong leaves one-quarter of an inch or more in length. Also grows in dense mats the plants interlocking in a net-like pattern. Duckweeds are valuable duck food.

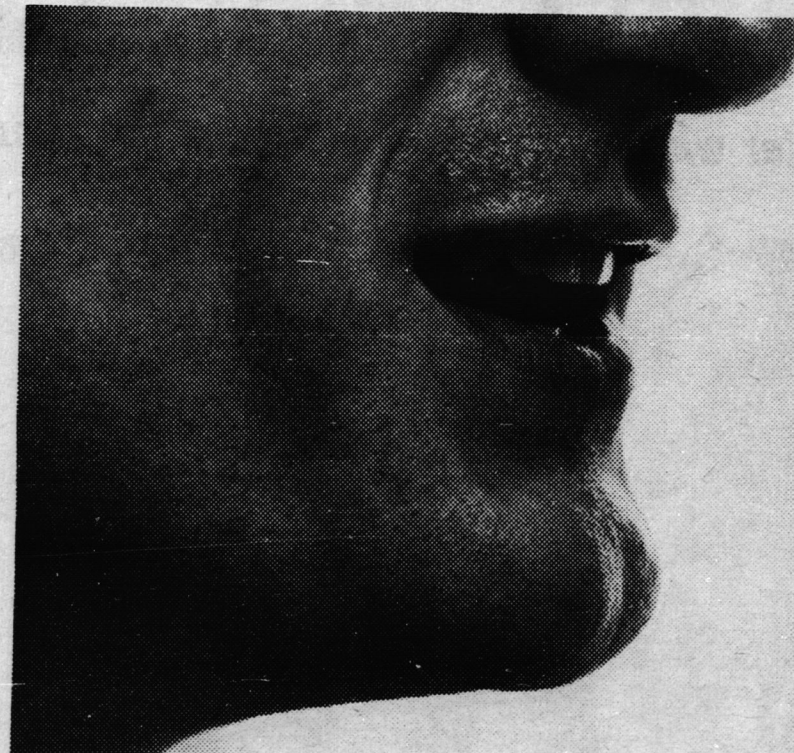

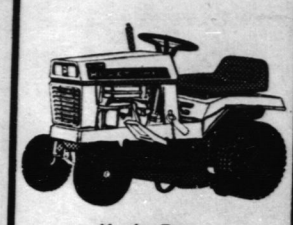

May 12 was the Annual Hospital Day. Six members attended the very enjoyable luncheon at Font-hill.

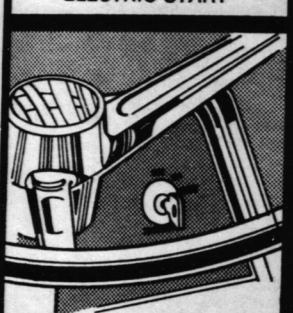

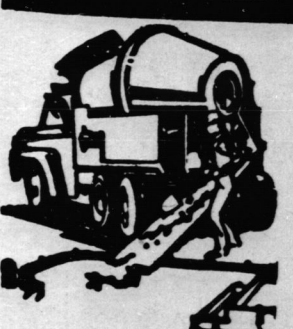

Federation Facts

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture's efforts to reduce farm input costs have been effective on a few more items.

In 1969 they declared war on tractor prices by importing a few popular make tractors at prices below which the same tractors were available here.

The result was lower priced tractors in that horsepower range for all farmers.

Last fall and winter the Federation took orders for cultivator times and points of the Kongsilde type that are manufactured in Denmark.

These cultivators and parts were already being imported, but the prices seemed high. Tines were selling for about \$6., points were selling from 80 cents to \$1. each. The O.F.A. sold tines at \$3. and points at 50 cents, about half the price that was charged in the market. A total of \$8,000. worth was sold and delivered this spring by the Federation.

The purpose was not to try and get into the parts business, but to prove what these parts could be sold for. The result has been very effective as the times that sold for about

\$6. are now available local suppliers for as low as \$3.25 and the points that sold for 80 cents to \$1. are available as low as 36 cents.

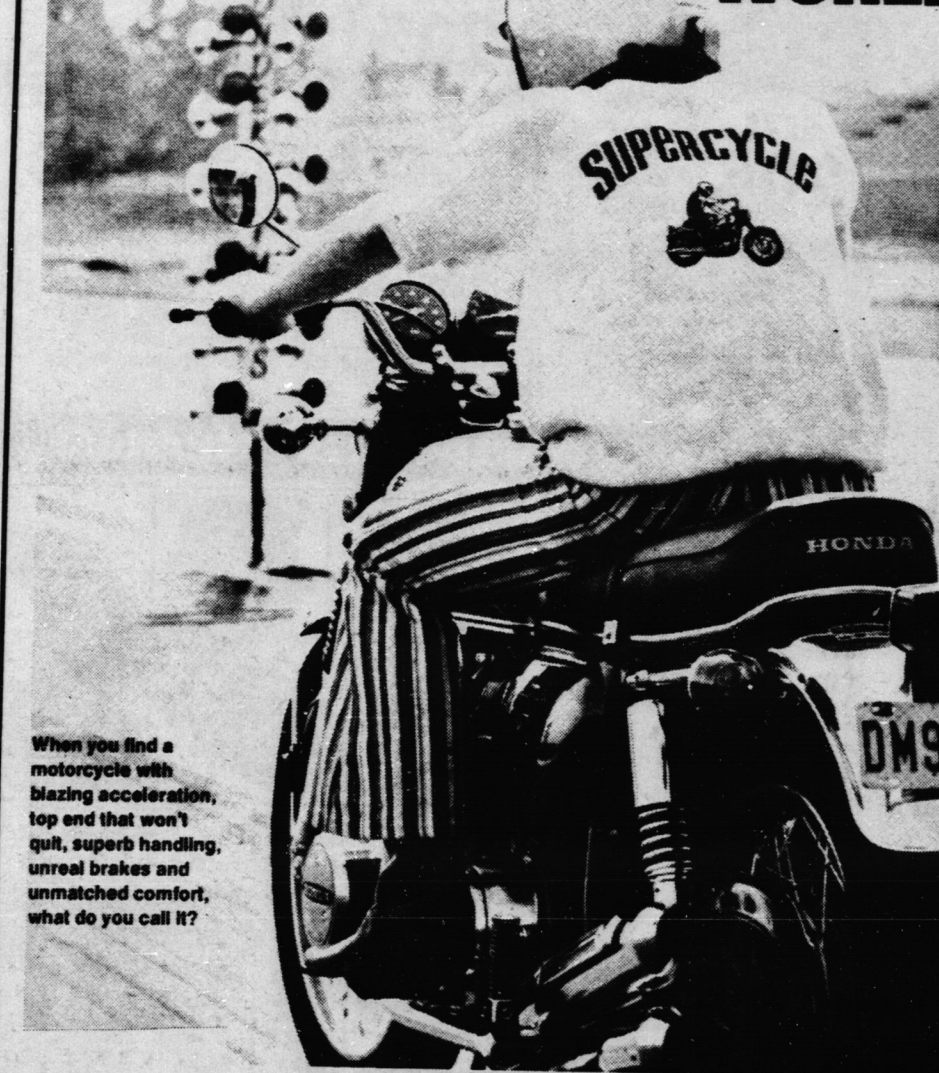
The whole exercise has once again proven that farmers need an organization to act as a watchdog on their behalf.
