Final Service Sunday For Canon Brooks Here

May 28 will mark the date of the final morning communion and sermon to be conducted by Canon E.A. Brooks as incumbent of St. Paul's, Jarvis and Christ Church, Anglican at Nanticoke.

The Rectory will be vacated on May 29 when Canon and Mrs. Brooks will take up residence at 121 St. Joseph's Drive, Apt 20, Hamilton when Canon Brooks will take up work at the Church of the Ascension.

The new Rector, Rev. Douglas Perry is expected to arrive in the Parish about June 15.

Canon Brooks was ordained Priest at the age of 24 by Bishop Owen in Christ Church Cathedral on May 22, 1932, 40 years ago, and is now looking forward to a change of activity. At the same time carrying with him the love, respect and appreciation of the faithful people of Christ Church and of St. Paul's with warm memories of their friendship and kindnesses.

Canon and Mrs. Brooks will carry with them the respect and affection not only of their own parishioners but of the citizens of Jarvis where they have found a sincere place

in the hearts of the people during the seven years they have been in Jarvis.

St. Paul's congregation has moved their regular morning service from starting at 11.30 a.m. to 11.45 a.m., so that members of

other congregations may attend the last service conducted by Canon Brooks. He has Taylor-Munro stated that he is cutting Knox Church service short in order to give Presbyterians time to attend.

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Editorial Comment:

Haldimand Takeover

Haldimand County Friday accepted a report suggesting a method of restructuring within its own boundaries as well as a "preferred proposal" that would extend the Haldimand boundary to take in Port Dover and part of Woodhouse Township.

The report could be considered excellent if the committee had stuck to its original instructions of preparing a report to restructure within Haldimand.

Where the report goes astray occurs when the committee makes its "preferred proposal."

In that short phrase the committee shows that a restructured Haldimand is not as workable as an area that includes part of Norfolk.

But it doesn't go far enough and take in either Simcoe or Waterford and part of Townsend Township.

How does the report get around the point that Simcoe will likely become the major population centre, yet not have any of the industrial assessment with which to provide the services necessary for a large population?

The suggestion is to get Norfolk to shift its border westerly and take in that area of Elgin County near Port Burwell that is the proposed site for Dofasco's new steel making operations, set to be built some time in the 1980s.

This, the report notes, would create two industrial areas. One in an enlarged Haldimand and the other in an enlarged Norfolk. But what about Elgin County?

Elgin County began a type of regional planning about 1966 when the Ford Motor Company announced its location at Talbotville, just west of St. Thomas.

The county council at that time tried to form an overall planning region, but if founded. A central planning region was established, along with an eastern and western region.

The argument that was forwarded in Haldimand County council for the extension of the county's boundary was that the areas of Port Dover and Woodhouse had asked to join. But judging from the reaction of municipal officials in those two areas, it was not with the intention of becoming a part of Haldimand County, but with the intention of forming the central area of a two county region.

The report is honest in its intent but perhaps three years late. It would have made an excellent starting point for discussion in 1969 when the Haldimand - Norfolk Study was instituted.
