ities in Haldimand.

Area A would be composed of Seneca, Oneida, Caledonia, North and South Cayuga and Cayuga. It would have a total population of 10,799 and assessment of 89,751,000.

Area B would comprise Canboro, Dunn, Moulton, Sherbrooke and Dunnville with a population totalling 11,333 and assessment at \$82,622,000.

Area C would be Walpole, Rainham, Jarvis and Hagersville. The total population would be 9,700 with assessment at \$ 87,651,000.

Representation from each of the three lower-tier municipalities would be six plus a mayor, reeve and deputy reeve for a total of nine.

The regional council would be responsible for planning, capital borrowing, health, public welfare, water trunk

lines, sewage trunk lines, garbage disposal sites, historical sites, regional road system and the assessment function would be returned to the regional municipality.

Area councils would have the functions of policing, water distribution, sewage collection, garbage collection, open space, parks, and recreation areas.

The preferred proposal would have area A composed of Seneca, Oneida, Caledonia, North Cayuga, Cayuga and Hagersville. This would provide a population of 12,319 and assessment at \$99,722,000.

Area B would be composed of Canboro, Dunn, Moulton, Sherbrooke, Dunnville, South Cayuga with a population of 12,074 and assessment at \$88,980,000.

The final new area would be Walpole, Jarvis, Rainham,

Woodhouse and Port Dover. Population would total 13,022 and assessment would be \$119,094,000.

The report will be forwarded to Nigel Richardson, Haldimand-Norfolk Study director. Mr. Richardson said he would accept the

report, although it is a month late for the deadline he set for submissions on his interim report on government restructuring.

Taylor-Munro welcomed those present in the absence of Rev. Zeebrugg, Hamilton District Secretary, a film and talk on Thailand was given by Mr. and Mrs. William Filsinger, of Cayuga.

Mrs. Leslie Fess of Chalmers presided with Mrs. Emerson Phillips giving the financial report to date and reading the minutes of the 1971 Annual meeting, in the absence of the secretary treasurer Mrs. Muriel Buckley of St. Paul's Anglican Church.

The report of the nominating committee was adopted as read. Officers to May 1973

A card was signed for a member in the hospital. A bake sale for June was discussed. A list of many small articles which could be included in the supply work was given out.

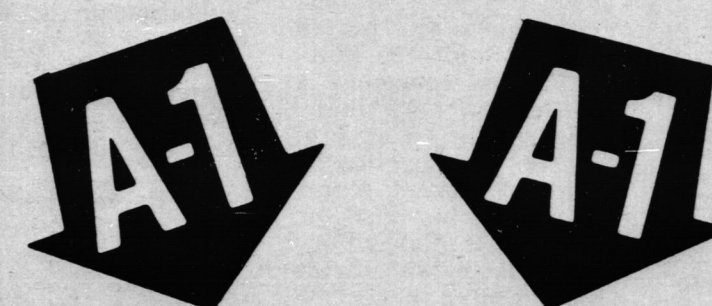
The June meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Ralph Golding with the roll call, a memory from Sunday school.
