On Oct. 23, 1972 the Haldimand ISM regional meeting was held at Kohler. Guest speaker for the evening was Frank Wall, 1st vice-president of O.F.A.

Mr. Wall spoke on capital gains tax, succession duties, tax credit plans and valuation day. As well as outlining O.F.A. policy in some of these matters, he also explained the effect on farmers.

A lively discussion followed Mr. Wall's talk. Licencing of farmers is an important matter being considered by O.F.A. at present. It is strongly felt that there is a real need for this type of licencing in order to stop the vertical integrator and to keep the family farm in Ontario alive.

Naturally there were many comments on O.F.A.'s proposal to licence farmers on the basis of a gross income not less than \$3,000 per year or a minimum of 50 per cent of income derived from agriculture.

The general feeling of the meeting was that O.F.A. should continue developing a policy to present a government in the near future, and a motion to this effect was carried.

The problem of snowmobile trespassers was also discussed and a resolution was passed that the Federation approach the police departments in Ontario to properly equip themselves with snowmobiles to apprehend those who are trespassing on a farmers field.

Four delegates were appointed to the annual convention in Hamilton on Nov. 27, 28, and 29, 1972. Otto Crone was re-elected as regional director for this year.

Don't forget the county annual meeting on Nov. 8 at Kohler (see ad elsewhere). A new executive will be elected and county delegates appointed to the convention. Come out to this important meeting and see what your Federation has done for you during the past year and let us know what you want done in the future.

and will be presenting a completely new act, an asset to any show. Macini, one of our newest junior members presents his unique type of magic, his own approach to the ancient art of Magic.

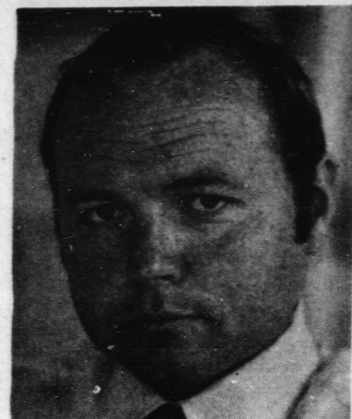
The show is produced and directed by members of the Hamilton

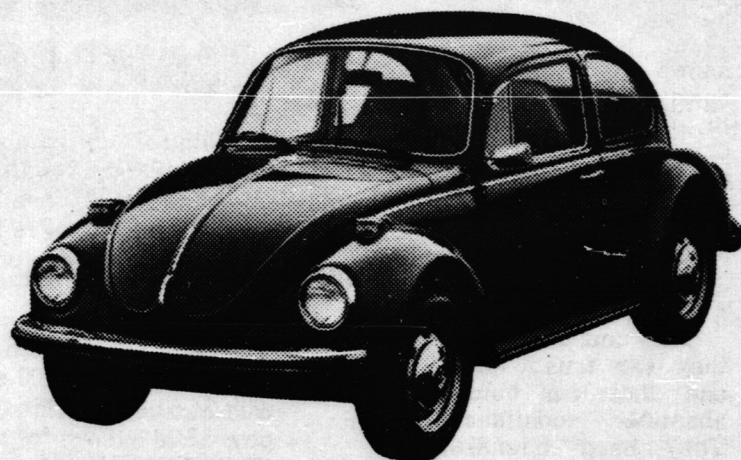

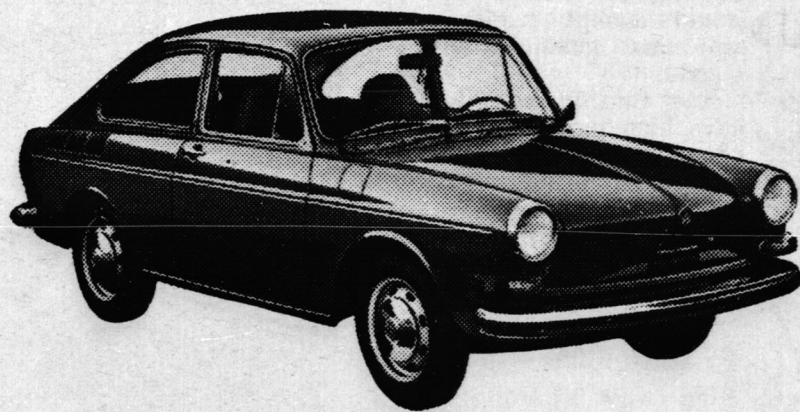

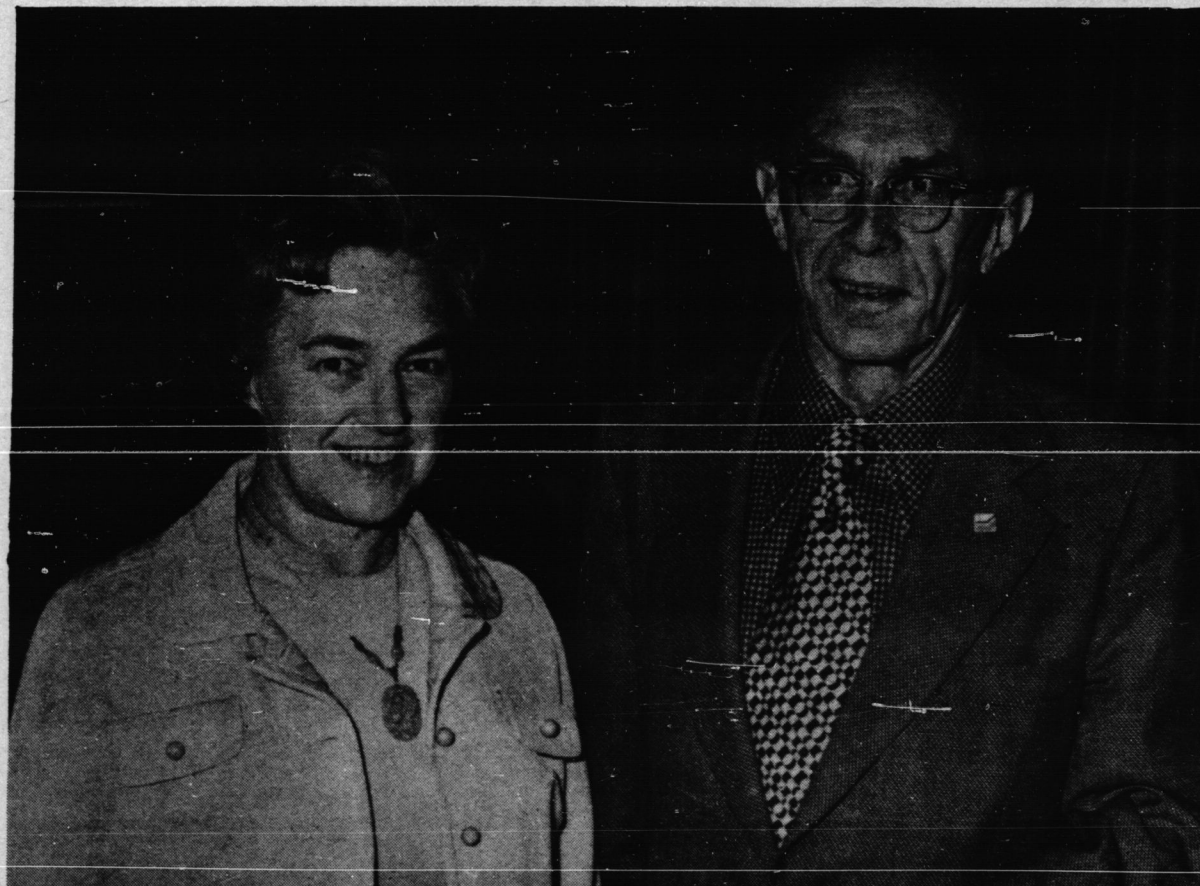
