Pesticide Controls Tighten

New regulations are being prepared by the Ontario government to tighten the control of pesticides through new regulations and licensing procedures.

The aim is to keep the more toxic of these pesticides out of the hands of non-professionals. Under the new provisions, retail outlets for the more toxic pesticides will be licensed, with these licenses indicating the class or category of pesticide that outlets are permitted to sell and to whom.

The new regulations will divide pesticides into four categories. Category D will encompass the most innocuous, such as pressurized insect repellants. Of the 2,800 pesticide products sold in Ontario, 802 fall into this category.

Class C pesticides used with reasonable care, would not constitute a health hazard or affect organisms outside their target group. There are 1,065 pesticides in this grouping.

Category B is the group for substances that present no hazard if used by experienced people, out should not be sold indiscriminately. This class includes the more concentrated formulas used in agriculture and forestry. There are 559 substances in this class.

The most restricted class is Category A. These would be sold only to licensed exterminators, agriculturists and other professionals.

Many of these substances will be available only on a specific use permit. The outlets selling these compounds will have to be licensed and keep complete sales records. A total of 375 products fall into this group.

This is the first time a provincial government

has taken this type of regulative action in the field of pesticides and while the home user will still have effective materials available to him, the new licensing rules will prevent the abuse of pesticides by inexperienced people.
