At the dinner meeting of the Haldimand Board of Education held in the Cayuga Secondary School on Monday Nov. 6, four retiring teachers who have completed 25 years of service to the education in Haldimand County and their spouses were guests.

Last year, 102 volunteers at The Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Toronto, transcribed 295 books from print into braille on subjects ranging from astrology to knitting. One book takes an average of 90 hours to transcribe. The training program for braille consists of one class a week for six months. At the end of the course there is a test and upon completion of 100 pages of braille with six consecutive error-free pages, a certificate is awarded to the volunteer.

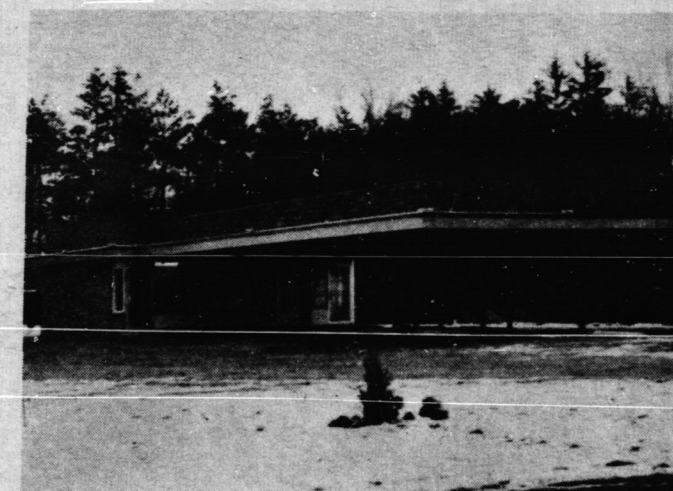
