

Anglican Synod Meets

HAMILTON - Clergy and lay people from Jarvis and Nanticoke were among several hundred in Hamilton Friday and Saturday, Nov. 11, 12, for the annual Synod of the Anglican Diocese of Niagara.

The theme of Synod, which is the annual meeting of the Anglican Church in the Diocese, was the role of Christian Education in the life and work of the church.

The delegates from St. Paul's, Jarvis and Christ Church, Nanticoke were the rector, Rev. R. D. Perry and the representatives of the congregations M. Hodgson and H. I. Snowden.

On Friday morning, delegates attended the opening Eucharist in Christ's Church Cathedral, at which the Rt. Rev. Walter E. Bagnall presented his annual charge to the diocese. At the conclusion of his charge, Bishop Bagnall announced that, if God spared him, he would begin his retirement at the end of July, 1973, after 24 years as Bishop of Niagara, and 45 years in the priesthood. In Niagara Diocese there are 88,288 members of 120 churches.

The rest of the two-day meeting was held at Hillfield - Strathallan Colleges, Hamilton. Christian Education was the subject of a three-hour session on Friday afternoon. Delegates from parishes throughout the diocese worked in groups made up of delegates from neighbouring parishes in the same or nearby communities, in an attempt to discover how this important work can be best accomplished. The education session was designed and directed by Rev. Murray MacInnes, of Toronto, and Rev. Colin Proudman, of the National Office of the Anglican Church.

In other work, the Synod considered the current state of church union negotiations with the United Church of Canada, and was presented with white papers on Restructuring of the Diocese and on Christian Initiation. These papers will be the subject of lengthy study and discussion during the next 12 months.

During Synod, Bishop Bagnall paid tribute to Malcolm Evans, who recently resigned as Director of Planning and Programs, and he welcomed the Rev. Larry Reese as the new Director, as well as a number of other clergy who are new to the diocese. There was also an address by Rt. Rev. S. K. Patro, Bishop of the Diocese of Bhopal in the newly-formed Church of North India.

Bishop Patro, in the Hamilton area on a goodwill visit sponsored by Presbyterian, United and Anglican Churches, was ordained a priest in the Anglican Church of India in 1949.

Federation Facts

Wednesday, Nov. 8 was the date of the annual meeting of the Haldimand County Federation of Agriculture.

The President called the meeting to order and noted only 25 members were present.

He noted that it was unfortunate so few farmers take time to attend their annual meeting.

The various committees reported on their activities during the year. One new committee reporting for the first time was the corn growers, who have been actively working with other counties in the province to set up a corn agency with the goal of stabilizing future corn prices. As yet no agency has been formed but steps in this direction are being taken.

Two important resolutions were passed which will be dealt with at the annual O.F.A.

convention in Hamilton during November. One concerned expropriation and recommends that the expropriation act be changed to make it mandatory for the Land Compensation Board to deal with a case and settle it before an expropriator can take possession of the land.

The other resolution recommends an additional \$2,000 capital grant be added to the capital grants program for the purpose of tile drainage.

Delegates to the annual convention were appointed and a new executive was elected as follows: Otto Crone, Gordon Booker, Russell Smith, Phil Hare, Maurice Teeft and Joe Nelles. Marc Stephenson was re-elected as Director to the monthly O.F.A. meetings.

Remember this is your executive for the coming year, let them hear from you. They

cannot know the needs and problems on all the concessions in Haldimand County unless you, the farmer, inform them.
