It was then noted that of the 260 gas consumers in the two townships, approximately 250 had already signed

Reeve Powell said that if the county supported these private groups, "it will return to haunt us. "However, an

assessment of the gas lines could be done by the county and then the information could be available for all touse. These private groups could also use the information."

Dr. Kenneth Mustard, of Dunnville, said there was a principle involved if the county was to support private groups. "This would e an undesirable precedent," he said. "These people should be supporting them-

"While I am not against support for these people, I can't involve the taxpayers of my community to support it. If there are some 900 people involved, I think a small donation from each of them would
