

Nanticoke 'Will Never Be The Same,' Says Grove

NANTICOKE (Staff) - "The only thing you have to accept is that Nanticoke will never be the same again."

For the villagers of Nanticoke this became rapidly apparent as Eric Grove, assistant director of the Haldimand-Norfolk Study pointed out to them last Thursday that in 10 years "Nanticoke pro-

bably won't be a very nice place to live."

He was referring to the fact that in 10 years the village will be almost surrounded by the Steel Company of Canada's steel making facilities on the west, Texaco Canada Ltd's refinery to the north-east and Ontario Hydro's plant to the east.

Mr. Grove said there "are no magic formulas or remedies. Stelco and Texaco won't go away."

On a map he showed the area that the Haldimand-Norfolk Study has set out as primarily industrial region, which is surrounded by a "green belt" where no industrial or residential development may take place. This takes up an

area of about 22,000 acres.

Mr. Grove said that while the air and water pollution controls will be high, the air management branch of the government has deemed it advisable not to have any concentration of urban growth within this area.

He said the spaces left open at present

will be filled up systematically when new industry decides to locate in the area. One of the first spaces would be the area between Stelco and Texaco, north of Nanticoke.

Thus Nanticoke will eventually be completely surrounded by industry, he said.

"The crux of the situation is where do we go from here? You could take no action, but I think this would be very wrong, for you would certainly lose your investment in your land and property."

Walpole Candidates To Voice Opinions At Meeting

Voters in Walpole Township will have a chance this Thursday night to meet the candidates who are running for office in the upcoming Dec. 4 municipal elections.

The meeting is to be held at 8.15 p.m. and will be open to all voters in Walpole.

The election battle lines have been drawn up in Walpole with the post of deputy reeve being contested along with seven persons seeking three possible seats on council.

Reeve Gordon Miller was returned to his post by acclamation on Nov. 13.

Incumbent Deputy-Reeve Bruce Meehan, of R.R. 4 Jarvis has been on Walpole council since 1960. He remained in the position of councillor for seven years before becoming deputy reeve.

a post he has held for the past five years. Prior to his being on council he served on the school board for three years.

Mr. Meehan was born and raised in Walpole and operates a dairy and hog farm.

Mr. Meehan forsee the next council as being "an extremely

busy one. It appears regional government will be coming in sometime during the next two years and whether or not I'm entirely in favor of regional government, I think we as a council should be willing to work towards it and be prepared for it when it comes."

Regarding problems along the lakefront in the township, Mr. Meehan said "there are problems, but they can

be solved. However, it takes time and it will be a matter of a year or so before they are ironed out."

Contesting the deputy reeve position is Howard Nicklin, of R.R. 2 Nanticoke.

Mr. Nicklin first came to the area in 1928 and became a full time resident six years ago. He is engaged in the design and manufacturing of

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Five Hopefuls Seek Four Jarvis Seats

An advance poll in Jarvis on Monday came up with no votes being cast, but nevertheless,

there is an election for municipal councillors in the village on Dec. 4.

The election came about when all four incumbents on Jarvis council decided to stand for nomination, plus the addition of a former councillor.

C. E. (Ted) Oldham had been a member of council up until last year when he was forced to leave council because of his job. He used to run a hardware business in the village

and is now a caretaker with the Haldimand County Board of Education.

Reeve Dr. William Austin was acclaimed to his position for a second term. Also acclaimed were the two Haldimand Board of Education representatives.

The four incumbents seeking re-election are Clifford McBride, Klaas Druyff, James Davidson and John Brintnell.
