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lighting equipment for the interior decorating trade in southern Ontario.

Mr. Nicklin is president of the Walpole Township Citizen Action Association.

In seeking the position of deputy reeve, Mr. Nicklin said he is in favor of orderly development in the township so that industry will not be permitted to "ramble along the lakeshore."

"In the event anyone is displaced by industry, I would certainly be prepared to fight for fair replacement values for the property."

Mr. Nicklin also feels there is "not a real balance of representation on the present council."

He said this has not permitted council to "properly consider and express the aspirations of many taxpayers in Walpole."

Of the six men and one woman seeking council seats, two are incumbents.

W. C. Evans, of Nanticoke, has been on council since 1970 and is seeking to serve a second term.

Mr. Evans was born and raised in Nanticoke where he and his wife own and operate a hardware store. He also works in the construction, electrical and plumbing trades in the area.

Having lived in Nanticoke all his life, Mr. Evans feels he has "a personal stake" in the future of the village.

"I don't want to see anybody loose any sleep over the future of the village, but we, as a council, will have to do what we can for the people here."

(Mr. Evans was referring to a meeting last Thursday when assistant director of the Haldimand-Norfolk Study Eric Grove disclosed that in all likelihood the village will cease to exist in 10 or 15 years).

Another reason Mr. Evans is seeking return to council is "because I like it, I am

intrigued by government and I enjoy meeting and helping people. I have no personal axe to grind."

The other incumbent seeking reelection is Blake Field, of R.R. 2 Nanticoke.

Mr. Field has been on Walpole Council since 1960. He is a former farmer and now works as a maintenance man for the Steel Company of Canada.

David Burrows, who is seeking his first term of office on the council lives and works as a store manager in Hamilton. He owns property at R.R. 2 Nanticoke.

Neither Mr. Field nor Mr. Burrows were available for comments at the time of writing.

James Cole, who sought election as reeve in the 1970 election, is seeking a seat on council this time around. He is a resident of Selkirk and has taken courses in law and real estate appraising at McMaster University.

Mr. Cole, entering the election, said he is opposed to the implementation of regional government. He said that local government should be run at the local levels and not from regional centres. This, he feels, will only add another level of bureaucracy and red tape.

Phil Hare, of R.R. 2 Nanticoke, is a Walpole native and has farmed for the past 12 years. He is a director of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association and a member of the executive of the Haldimand Federation of Agriculture.

Mr. Hare is also an executive member of the South Walpole Home and School Association.

Mr. Hare said he is aware of the changes taking place in the township and society, but appreciates the traditional farm life and is willing to defend it.

He said he is also aware of the problems

along the lakeshore and is willing to listen and talk about the problems.

Mrs. Dorothy Lawrek is seeking her first term on council and is the first woman to run in a Walpole election.

She and her husband have lived in Nanticoke for the past three years, having purchased the property in 1967. Prior to that she lived in Toronto and Grimsby.

She was the founder of the Walpole Township Citizen Action Association, its first vice-president and is now on the board of directors.

She is also active in politics, having been the official agent for the New Democratic Party candidate in the recent federal election.

Mrs. Lawrek said she is seeking a council seat in order to provide a better balance on council. "Council should certainly have representatives from the lakefront areas as well as from agriculture and business."

"I also think that public should be better informed on where and how their tax dollars are being spent. If you ask a question of a councillor, you should get an answer and not have to go to the township office for the information," she said.

Ernie Welt, a merchant in Nanticoke, moved to the village in 1964. Prior to that he lived in Jarvis, since 1945, where he served on Jarvis council for four years.

Since moving to Nanticoke he has served as chairman of a committee to gain street lights and is the current chairman of the Nanticoke Citizens Committee and a member of the Nanticoke Community Hall Board.

Mr. Welt has been involved in community affairs since coming to the area and feels that if he is elected he would like to represent the township "as a whole, not just a particular part of it."

The committee is investigating the extension of library resource centres in the elementary schools, instrumental music in the elementary schools as well as instrumental music in the Dunnville and Caledonia secondary schools.

In modern languages, the committee reported 868 students are studying French. New courses introduced this year are German and Spanish with 29 enrolled in the former and 49 in the latter.

It was noted the demand for Latin is declining and at present 14 students are in the program. The decline is general in most areas of the province.

The policy committee reported a study of the Reville Report had been undertaken. The report is the result of a commission considering further negotiations between boards and teachers.

The committee also recommended involvement in the winter works program in order to improve education and provide employment.

The transportation committee reported on a new grant formula, which was being costed out. It appears the transportation policies of the board will fit the new formula and it is expected the transportation scheme will be approved for grant.

It was noted that some areas of the province are finding their transportation program not completely approved.

The property committee recommended final payment on the Anna Melick and Cayuga Secondary School additions.

The committee further recommended the sale of the Stirling St. property of 7.9 acres in Caledonia.

The property was purchased by Genron Developments for \$61,000, the highest of six bidders.

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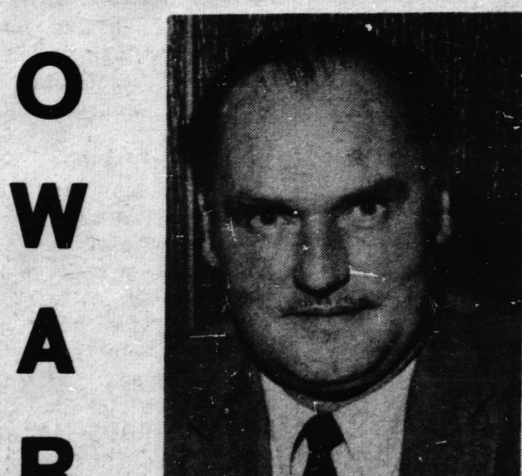
