Reeve John Kincaid said that "whatever they're doing, it's better than before. Many of the problems at the plant have been eliminated."

Coun. Basili then suggested that perhaps something could be done with the water system.

Reeve Kincaid noted it was just a year ago that council began talks with the then OWRC about the takeover of the sewage plant and at that time it was mentioned they might also take over the water treatment operation.

Hagersville has been plagued with poor water quality, due mainly to a high sulphur content. The problem has been a difficult one with the water changing from day to day and from place to place in the village.

As Coun. Robert Gedyne put it: "It won't cost us anything to at least have them (the ministry) come down and talk about it. 'We're satisfied with the sewage treatment plant operation and now we should have them look into the water situation,' he said.

Hagersville's proposed anti-loitering by-law and parking bylaw has come in for some public reaction. The bylaw was outlined at the last council meeting by Police Chief Warren Burger. It has since been sent on to the village's solicitor for his comments.

Reeve Kincaid said he had received a number of calls on the proposal that would, among other things, reduce parking in the downtown areas to one

hour from two hours. He said there have also been complaints about the bylaw that would eliminate snowmobiles from public areas.

Reeve Kincaid said that so far the final form of the bylaws have not been determined and will only be finalized following the solicitor's recommendations, along with recommendations from the various appointed boards and committees, such as the parks board. Council will then have a chance to discuss the bylaws fully and make final decisions.

Coun. Gedyne said, from his reading of the bylaw in its proposed form, snowmobiles are not banned from park areas. "What it says, I think, is that snowmobiles would be confined to designated areas, or other areas on special occasions. All in all it is a good draft bylaw."

"We have got to start somewhere. We have got to be sure that we are protected if anyone is injured on our property. If we have no controls, then we are condoning whatever action is taking place. However, the controls should not be so stringent that no one can have a good time."

Coun. Norman Crawford noted that the Haldimand Board of Education "frowns on any use of its properties for the same reason."

Deputy-Reeve Ross Slope suggested the only way the snowmobile users can effectively voice their opinions in the matter is to form an association of some type and then come to council with some proposals.

the village with a green belt, but that this also would not be a satisfactory solution because of the very limited size the green belt could be.

Another alternative might be to enlarge the village to take up the area between Stelco and Texaco. But, Mr. Grove noted, many of workers who will be moving into the area prefer to live a little further away from their work than Nanticoke would be from the industrial plants.

"There would be a great risk in this and it might not catch on," he said.

Noting some alternatives, Mr. Grove said the village could be removed with the government paying a fair market value for the homes and businesses, plus a little extra.

Or, he said, the government could suggest that Nanticoke disperse voluntarily within 10 years, with the government having first refusal on any land sale in the village. If at the end of 10 years anyone was left in the village, then the government would have to expropriate.

There could be the creation of a new Nanticoke, with the government financing the moving of buildings and people.

Mr. Grove said a new site would be chosen and water and sewer services would be installed before the people could relocate on the new site.

As another alternative, Mr. Grove said the villagers could move to places such as Selkirk, Fisherville, Jarvis or Nelles Corners. Compensation would be paid for the move, he said.
