

OPP Report

CAYUGA - On Nov. 23, at 4.25 a.m. a car-truck collision on Highway 6 just north of Willowgrove claimed the life of Brian Porter of Hamilton. The deceased was northbound and struck a transport truck operated by Laurence Slack of R.R. 5 Hagersville, which was southbound on Highway 6.

Porter was pronounced dead at the scene by Coroner Dr. M. Jackson of Caledonia. Dr. Jackson advised no inquest will be held. Const. W. D. Broughton investigated.

On the same date, at about 10.25 p.m., Const. R. Horton investigated a one car collision on County Road 40 between Dunnville and Stromness which claimed the life of Norman Andrews, 70, of R.R. 2 Lowbanks.

Mr. Andrews was eastbound, drove off roadway and struck a

tree stump. Mr. Andrews was pronounced dead by Coroner Dr. W. C. B. Mills at the Dunnville Hospital.

The two deaths on this date brings the total to 12 people killed in 12 collisions in 1972 compared to 18 fatal collisions with 22 persons killed for the same period in 1971.

On Nov. 26, at 11.20 a.m., Const. R. Fox investigated a two car collision at the junction of Indiana Road and Turnbull Sideroad, Seneca Township, caused injuries to four persons and an estimated damage of \$2200, being sustained.

A vehicle operated by Hubert Turnbull, R.R. 1 Canfield collided with a vehicle operated by Arthur Elder also of R.R. 1 Canfield.

Both drivers were injured as were Ethel Elder and Patricia Turnbull. Both parties were returning home from attending the same church services. Twelve other motor vehicle collisions were

investigated resulting in injuries to five persons.

On Nov. 22, a Wilsonville man lost a set of oxy-acetylene tanks from rear of his truck on Mud St., west of Hagersville.

About 10 minutes after the loss, two males in a 70-71 Chrysler, dark green were seen picking up the tanks and leaving the area. Anyone with any information pertaining to the identity of persons involved, please contact Cayuga O.P.P.

WORTH WAITING FOR: THE VERY LATE SUPPER

When we use the term late supper, we don't mean it's late because your husband hasn't arrived home from the office yet. In some European countries, among many families, it is considered de rigueur to have dinner served quite late in the evening.

In the skiing villages of the French Alps, after a strenuous evening of schussing and stem-christieing, a hot bowl of French Onion Soup, some garlic-flavoured French bread, and a Caesar salad is the perfect combination for a climax to a full day. The same holds true for Canada's skiing fraternity.

Onion Soup

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| 1/4 cup butter or margarine | 6 slices toasted French bread |
| 1/4 teaspoon pepper | 6 tablespoons freshly grated Parmesan cheese |
| 4 large onions, thinly sliced | |
| 4 cups beef stock | |
| (4 bouillon cubes dissolved in 4 cups boiling water) | |

Sauté onions in butter until tender, stirring to separate into rings. Add stock and pepper to onions, bring to a boil. Add salt and lemon juice. Place a slice of toast on each serving and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon cheese. Servings may be placed under the broiler for a short time until cheese bubbles.

French Bread

Makes great eating with soups and salads.

Method:

Cut the loaf in diagonal 1 inch slices. Spread each side of each slice with melted butter seasoned with garlic powder or mixed with crushed garlic. Wrap tightly in foil and heat in a 275°F oven for 30 minutes.

A Great Caesar Salad

Serves 6

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|-----------------------------------|----------------------------|
| 1/2 cup salad or olive oil | 2 cups croutons |
| 2 tablespoons lemon juice | 1 clove of garlic |
| 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce | 1 tablespoon cider vinegar |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt | 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard |
| 1 small can anchovies | 1/4 teaspoon pepper |
| 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese | 1 large head of romaine |
| | 1 egg |

Add garlic clove to oil 24 hours before using.

Remove garlic and combine 1/4 cup oil with lemon juice, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, salt and pepper. Cut anchovies into small pieces, save a few for garnish and add to dressing.

Tear romaine into pieces and add dressing and cheese.

Toss lightly until romaine is coated.

Break egg into salad and toss until well mixed.

Sprinkle croutons over salad, mix lightly, serve immediately.

Croutons

Trim crusts from 4 slices enriched white bread, cut into 1/2 inch cubes.

Fry in 1/4 cup oil, add garlic powder or garlic bud to taste, stirring constantly until brown and very crisp.
