Hurricanes Clobber Caledonia

The Hagersville Hurricanes ran and passed their way to a lopsided win over Caledonia last Friday to the tune of 61-0. This win put Hagersville at the top of the league with a perfect 2 and 0 record as they look like they will repeat as Zone champions again.

A matter of continuing concern to the Federation of Agriculture, and a concern which has been expressed frequently in recent years by commodity organizations, is the undue hardships and inequity weighing upon producers of farm products when non-payment for their produce results, when processors or dealers go into bankruptcy.

Farmers are too far down the line of priorities when a firm goes into receivership. According to the Bank Act, registered liens upon property come first. Then claims for wages, salaries or other remuneration and growers of perishable products that are direct from the soil, and producers of dairy products. These have priority every bank claims and are given preferred status over livestock and poultry.

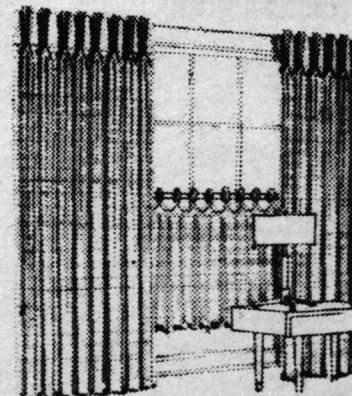
