ents in Haldimand objecting to the discontinuance and forwarded to Haldimand County Council. Approximately 1,000 names have been signed on petitions.

At the last county council meeting a resolution was endorsed asking that the province "take steps to see that every possibility be explored and every effort be made to continue this important and primary energy resource available to the householders of Haldimand."

Council contended the action by the gas for economic reasons "has been taken with no apparent attempt having been made to rectify this problem by re-routing of lines, change of rates, etc."

Council also stated that once the company has disfranchised "a large sector of the rural community, a precedent will have been established for use throughout Ontario whereby the vital energy may be denied all but the city dweller and industrial complex."

It was also felt that since governments have assisted the export of a natural gas, "they should now be prepared to assist in maintaining adequate future supplies for Canadian customers."

He grows tobacco for Mike DeVos and credits careful management of his crop and the selection in the field of the tobacco he plans to exhibit for his success.

He planted 48 acres of Virginia 115 this spring and lost 45 acres during the frost in June.

Mr. Godelie managed to replant most of the crop and in order to keep it going irrigated four times and sidedressed twice. He finished harvesting Sept. 23 and got 38 kilns off.

A total of 18 growers entered the competition. In the 4-H tobacco competition, Elizabeth Zei, of R.R. 2 Courtland was the individual champion and the Charlotteville 4-H Club took the overall championship.

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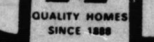
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
