

Council To Sell Land For School For \$250

Jarvis council Tuesday night decided to sell the half-acre of the unopened portion of Julius St. to the Haldimand county board of education for \$250.

The portion sold was requested earlier this year by the board of education so that it might have clear title to the land in the event of having to build a new public school in Jarvis.

Council gave first and second readings to the bylaw which will turn the land over to the board and set the \$250 figure on the land.

Council noted that the land cannot easily be serviced and its only use would be by the school board. The board currently owns land on all three sides of the property.

If a new school were to be built, the board

has indicated it would be located north of the present school and likely on a portion of the unused street allowances.

Council last month wrote the Ministry of the Environment asking what steps it was taking on its phosphate removal plans for the lagoon in Jarvis.

Clerk Robert Lysch said that while no letter had been re-

ceived, he had had a call on the matter saying the type of removal that was tested earlier this year had proved too expensive and that the ministry was working on a alum solution spray that would work in lagoon systems.

Cost of the application would be about \$1,000 a year.

Reeve Dr. William Austin said the alum solution could be ap-

plied on the lagoon from a small boat. The alum precipitates the phosphate out of the water and would be applied prior to the lagoon being flushed.

Provincial regulations require that phosphate levels from all Ontario municipalities are to be reduced by 80 per cent.

A city of Pembroke request for support of a resolution asking for

greater action on the part of the board of censors in the province was endorsed by council.

The Pembroke resolution stated that the council was concerned about the levels of license now being reached in books, television, films and magazines and asked that the board of censors

Norfolk County Fair Sets Attendance Record

SIMCOE - Attendance records tumbled at this year's edition of the Norfolk County Fair when 110,026 people passed through the gates of the 132 year old fair. The figure surpassed the old record set in 1970 by 5,126.

Records were set each day of the fair, except Friday, when it rained almost non-stop throughout the day.

Saturday's attendance was by far the greatest with some 36,311 entering the fairgrounds.

Saturday's big attraction, for many, was the presence of Prime Minister Trudeau during the morning and Progressive Conservative leader Robert Stanfield during the evening.

The gate receipts reached \$64,801, topping the previous record of \$51,040 set last year.

The Tommy Hunter show at the grandstand Friday drew crowds estimated at 4,000, which helped to fill out an otherwise low attendance day.

The Warrior's Day Parade Saturday was one of the largest ever with more than 1,500 people taking part in the parade which marched past the grandstand at the fairgrounds.

New Library Centre To Open On Saturday

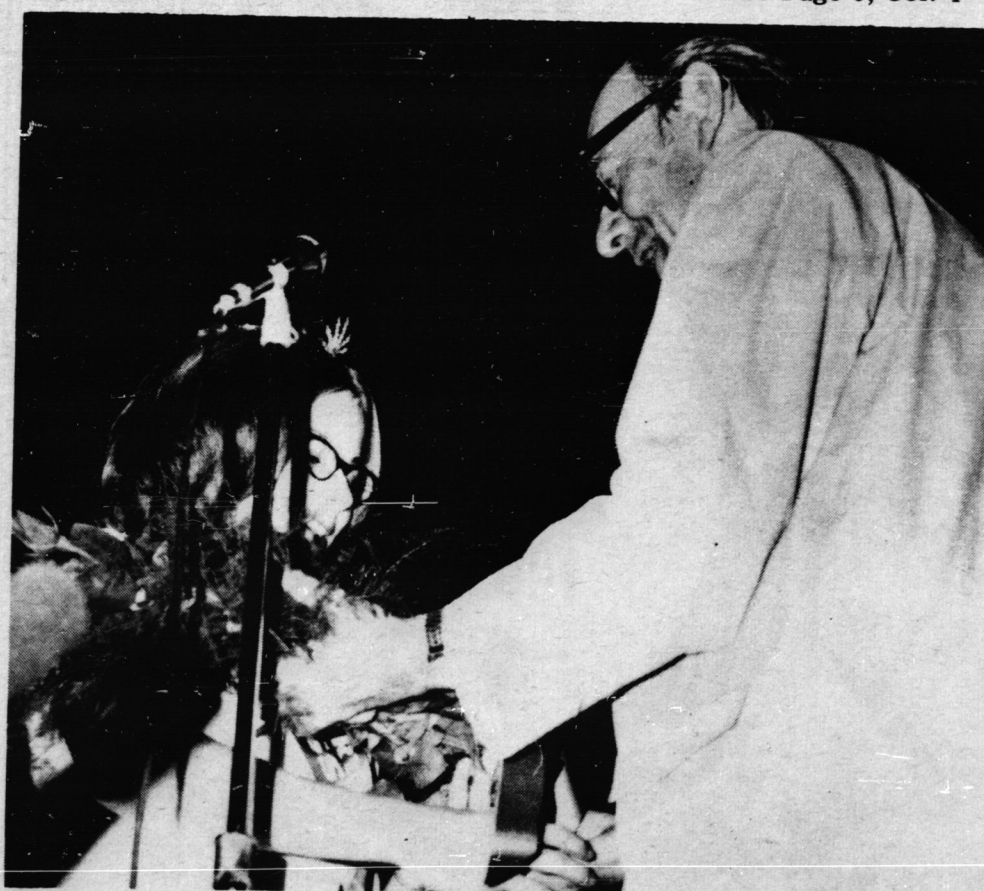

Trudeau Urges Urban Rural Balance Maintained

SIMCOE - The balance between urban and rural areas in Canada must be preserved Prime Minister Trudeau said here Saturday during a short tour of Haldimand and Norfolk counties.

The Prime Minister appeared at the final day of the Norfolk County Fair after a

tour through Caledonia, Hagersville and Jarvis.

He asked that the public have faith in the greatness of Canada and not be put off with predictions of gloom and doom by other parties.

Canadians are looking confidently to the future, he said. Canada is a strong country with strong people

prepared to meet any challenge and a strong government which can talk with other countries on equal terms, he said.

Mr. Trudeau noted that fans returning from Moscow and the Canada-Russia hockey series kissed the soil

Nomination Changes Outlined
