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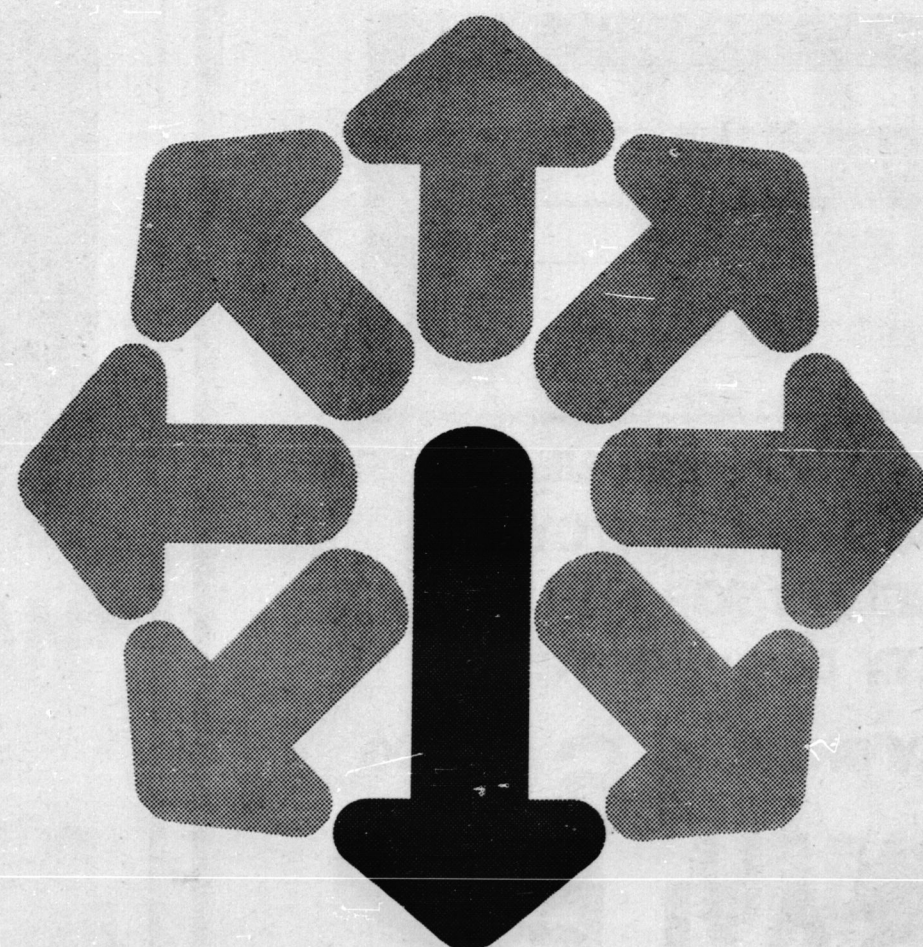

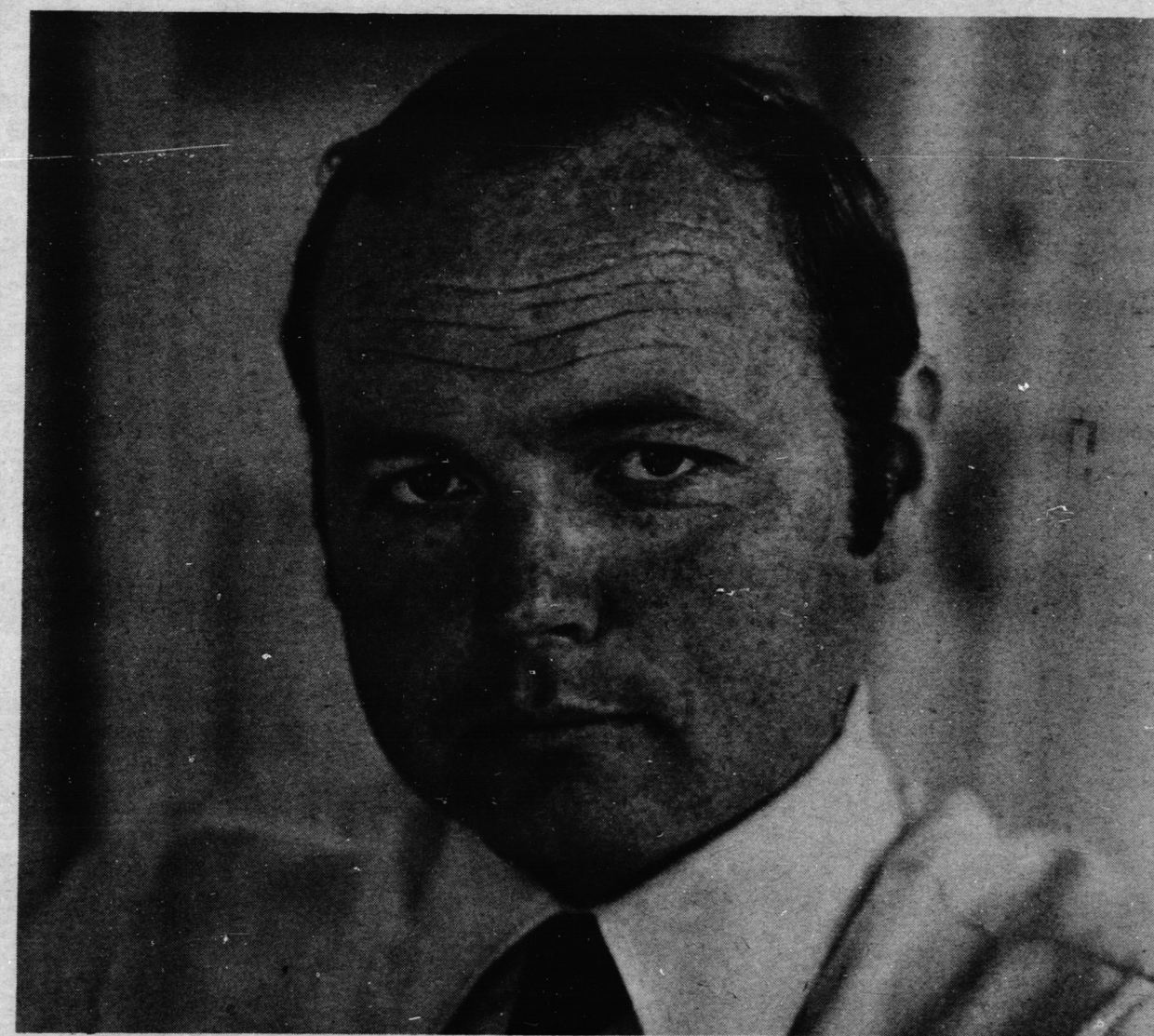

\$3,800. It is interesting to note that though money was scarce the sum was raised by the small congregation within three years - every member pulling his fair load - of the building's cost.

In the year 1936, the Franklyn Legge Pipe Organ was bought and installed in the remodelled choir loft. A kitchen was also built
