On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - Haldimand Plowmen advise that their annual match will be held at the farm of William Huffman, near Springvale, on Thursday Oct. 19, 1972.

While this is not the time of year when farmers expect to see much evidence of warble grubs or heel flies, it is the time of year when they can do something to make sure they will have no warble grubs next spring or flies during the summer months.

For several years now, systemic insecticides have been widely used for the control of cattle grubs. Highly effective, when properly applied, they kill the grubs before they get a chance to develop and form warbles in the back. In addition to controlling grubs, systemic also do a good job of suppressing lice.

Practically every beef producer is familiar with cattlegrubs, however, the actual extent of loss to the industry is not always appreciated. Losses to the processor come about through extra

trimming of damaged areas, devaluation of carcass value and loss in value of hides. As important as processing losses are, there are also various on-farm losses. Gadding during summer months can result in injury, weight loss and lowered gains. Further, there is evidence that grub-infested cattle make less efficient winter gains.

The ideal time to treat for grubs is the fall. You can choose systems for use as pour-ons, or a high pressure spray applications. Systemics are effective, easy to apply, and low-unit cost. Always apply systemics according to the manufacturer's instructions. Plan to treat your cattle this fall. While systemics are not generally recommended for dairy cattle they would be useful to the dairyman for treating young cattle.

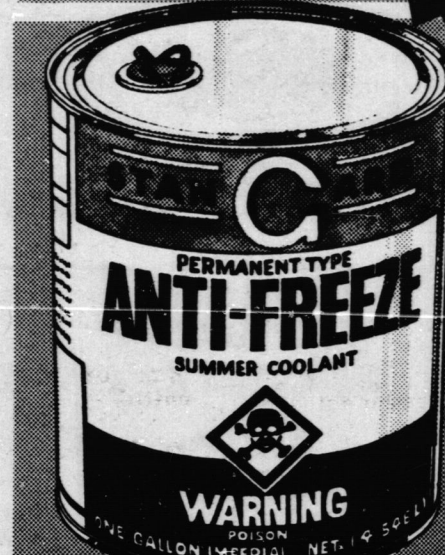
