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Hagersville Water, Sewer Project Starts Next Week

HAGERSVILLE - The long-awaited water and sewer project in Hagersville's west section is expected to begin next week.

The resident eng-

ineer for the project, from Proctor and Redfern, engineering consultants, moved in this week and construction equipment is expected to arrive

by the beginning of next week.

The project is being undertaken by Robert Simon Construction of Waterford, at a bid price of \$567,039 plus engineering and contingencies.

The firm was the low bidder of two. The other bid was for \$741,299.

The bid was in excess of the province's estimate and additional money is to be raised from areas outside the residents of the west section.

Half the money for the project will come from the province.

Council, at its meeting last week received a formal agreement for the waterworks and sewage works project.

Consideration is being given to the construction, perhaps in stages as the money is available, of an artificial rink.

The special project committee is composed of Drew Williamson, Stan Mitchell, Ted Montague and Neal Hoover, along with Lion vice-presidents Eugene

Montague, Bill Snowden, Don Mitchell and past president Don Leatherdale.

In other business, Lion Jack Brohman introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Bob Montgomery, who is plant manager for the Hagersville division of Livingston Industries.

ucts that include small trailers and forks for fork lift trucks. Andy Dodd, also on the Livingston staff, assisted by running the slide projector.

. . . In Two Games

Jarvis Chevies, Champs

The Jarvis Chevies won the OASA Intermediate 'B' championship in Jarvis on Saturday by taking two straight games from Elliot Lake.

This series had been postponed for a week from Thanksgiving weekend until Saturday as Elliot Lake was unable to field a team last week.

OASA president Cec Dunn was on hand to present the championship trophy and crests to the winners. This is the fifth time that Jarvis has won an all Ontario championship.

The Chevies had an easy time of it in the first game played in the afternoon winning 10-0. Lefty Bob Kozak pitched the win allowing just two hits.

Kozak struck out 10 and walked only two as he continued his great playoff pitching. This was his seventh playoff victory.

Jarvis got on the score board early scoring two runs in the first inning, three more in the second, three in the fourth, with two more in the seventh.

Ted Phibbs cracked a home run and double to lead the attack with Dennis Craddock, Ken Graham and Brian Smith getting two hits apiece.

Gord Fearman had a three run homer to go along with single hits by Paul Kett, Nick Pantzouri, Terry Dosser and Bob Kozak.

The second game played at night before a good crowd was a much closer game and if not for the cold weather might well have been won by the visitors.

Elliot Lake scored a run in the first inning

on a walk and two singles.

Only a perfect strike by center fielder Bill Prince kept the visitors from adding to their lead. Prince let go a real bullet to catcher Gord Fearman to get MacDonald out trying to score from second.

Elliot Lake batting last in this game added another run to go ahead 2-0 in the fifth. Again strong arms by the Chevie outfield kept the score close.

This time it was Craddock who cut a runner down at the plate.

Gord Fearman finally got the fans off their hands in the top of the sixth when he poled a long home run to left field. This was the first hit of the game for Jarvis as Menary kept throwing a lot of strikes past the Chevies.

The Chevies trailed 2-1 going into the top of the ninth and it looked like there might be a third game necessary. Fearman reached first when the left

fielder couldn't handle his fly ball.

The big break of the game came on the next play when Graham was called safe at first on a close play. Graham's good wheels made it close for a slower runner would have been an easy out.

Ted Phibbs then came through with a double to plate both runners. Elliot Lake picked a poor time to throw the ball around as Phibbs just kept running on the play and raced all the way home.

This was all Kozak needed as he bore down and struck out the last three batters in the ninth to give him six for five innings.

Kozak had relieved starter Ray Carpenter in the fifth after Carpenter had given up both runs and six hits. Carpenter struck out five and walked only one in the five innings he worked. Phibbs again showed the way with a double and single.

Fearman, Craddock and Graham were the only other Chevies to hit safely.

Social Credit Fields Candidate In Riding

A fourth candidate in the Oct. 30 federal election in the Norfolk-Haldimand riding has been declared.

He is Dave Mallory, 32, of R.R. 9 Dunnville and will represent the Social Credit party in the riding.

Mr. Mallory said he was "pleased to stand as a candidate for Social Credit" and to show that the Social Credit is an "alternative to the two stagnant old parties."

"I am very concerned that dissatisfied voters may accidentally elect an NDP govern-

ment and only make our present problems much worse," he said.

"For proof that Social Credit policies work, simply compare the west coast with the east, the rich economic conditions of Alberta and B.C. with the stagnated poverty of Quebec and the Maritimes," he said.
