

Annual Cancer Society Meeting

St. Bernard's Church Waterford was the scene of the Annual Cancer Society meeting in the form of a banquet with Canon R. Charles Brown of London as guest speaker. Jarvis Branch is located in the Norfolk Unit.

Approximately 100 enjoyed the roast beef dinner put on by the ladies of the church. Headtable guests were Father E. A. Morris who returned thanks, Mr. Delaney of the Ontario Division, Mayor Scott of Waterford

and Mrs. Scott, Mrs. C. M. Watters President of Norfolk Unit, Mrs. Paul Gilbertson Director who introduced the speaker Canon Brown and Mrs. Keith Sutherland Social Convener.

Canon Brown declared that he had been cured of cancer 17 years ago. Many in the audience had also experienced cancer cures. The speaker felt there was a special sense of fellowship among those who had been cured - a foundation stone -

which based the family of volunteers - which he likened to a four-wheeled group of dedicated people as opposed to a hearse.

Research is the base of hope for cure and the dedicated workers must interest others including those with early symptoms and our scientists whose aim is a cure.

Quoting figures, he said that last year in Ontario \$700,000 had been donated to the cancer society as against donations six years ago of \$24,000. This is definitely used for education and research.

A little knowledge is a dangerous thing. He urged all to move out from inner knowledge and noted the new films which were more interestingly colorful. He felt also that knowledge was not enough. All must respond and strengthen their natures by response.

Closing by quoting "He who plants a tree which he will never see mature is one of the world's great benefactors - so he who works as a 4 wheel Christian in the defeat of cancer is a great factor in the way of health.

He was thanked by E. A. Slieter, public school inspector and presented with a large cartoon of Norfolk apples.

Mrs. Cora McKenzie read a very interesting article from the Grand River Sackem which noted that there were 28 Chinese students in grade 13 at Caledonia school on their way to university in Canada as there are not schools enough in Hong Kong to accommodate them.

They have their own soccer team and can speak excellent English. The Canadian students try to make friends with them but find them a bit stand offish.

The president closed the meeting with prayer and a sale of food was auctioned by Mrs. Charles Powell - Frances Law acting as cashier.

3. THE CORPORATE WELFARE SYSTEM

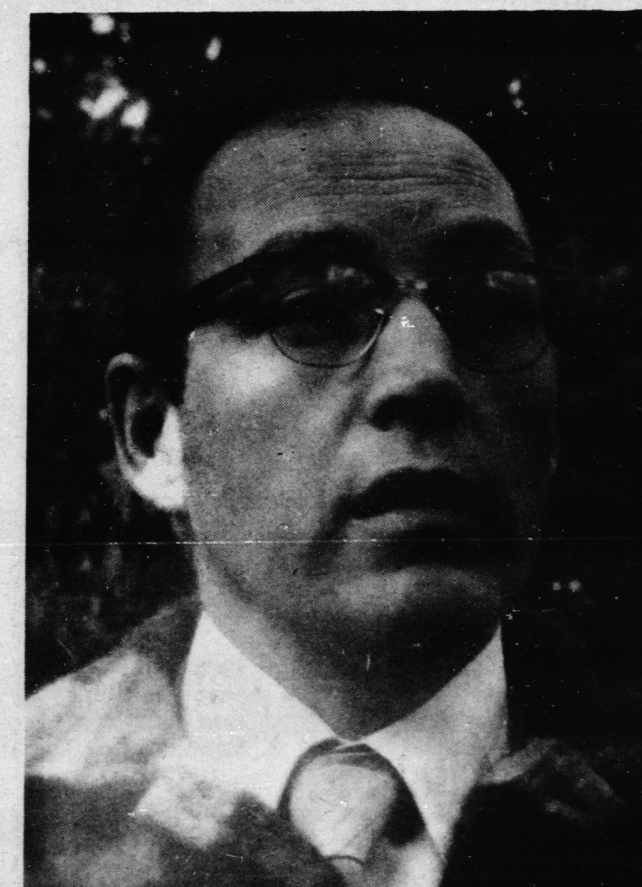

This would allow serviced lots to be provided for at \$4000. to \$4500. each. This land could be leased or leased with the option to buy. Monthly payments would be only \$21.75. On a 35 year mortgage this totals \$9,135. Saving on an expected growth of 20,000 homes is 20,000 X \$9,135 \$182,700,000. This \$182,700,000. will be left to circulate in the local economy instead of going out of the area perhaps even to a foreign country.
