QUINCY, Mass.-Adam G. Smith, 78, of 40 Ridgeway St., coach and captain of the 1923 Boston Athletic Association hockey team that represented the United States in the Olympics in 1924, died Oct. 12 at a local nursing home after a long illness.

Mr. Smith was born and educated in Jarvis, and served in the Canadian Army during World War I. He had lived in Centerville before moving to Quincy 31 years ago.

Mr. Smith was a hockey referee for all the national hockey leagues in the 1930s, and in 1923 he coached and captained the Boston Athletic Association hockey team that won the pennant that year, and went on to play in the Olympics. Mr. Smith was unable to participate at the Olympics because he was not yet an American citizen.

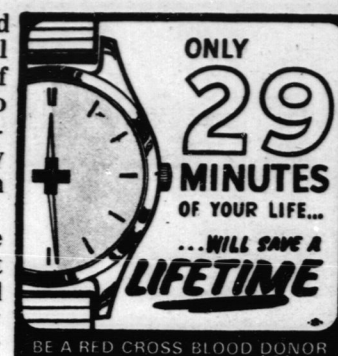

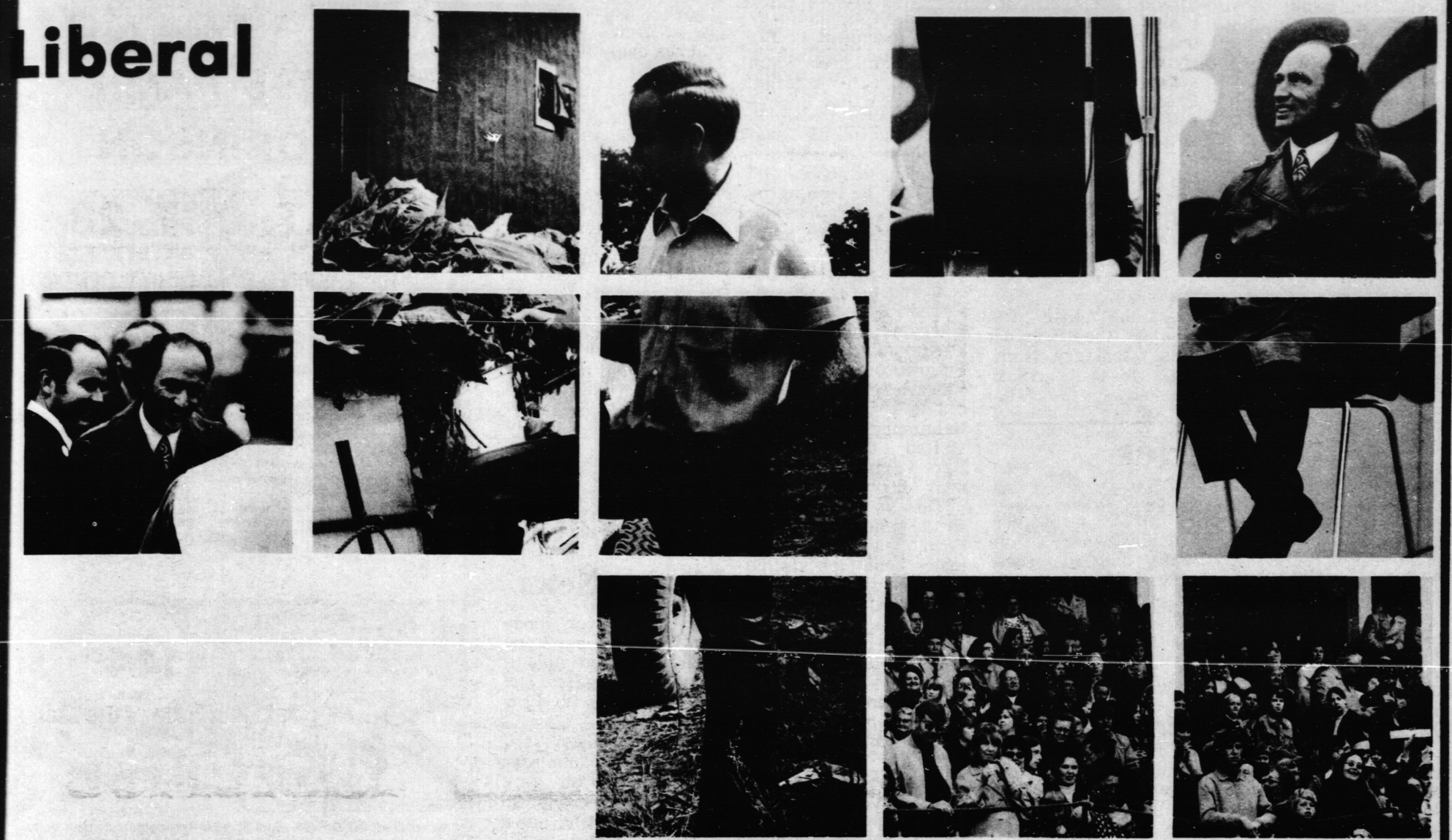
