A plant was sent to Mrs. Helen Brown, past president of W. H. Executive, whose mother, Mrs. Brennan, passed away.

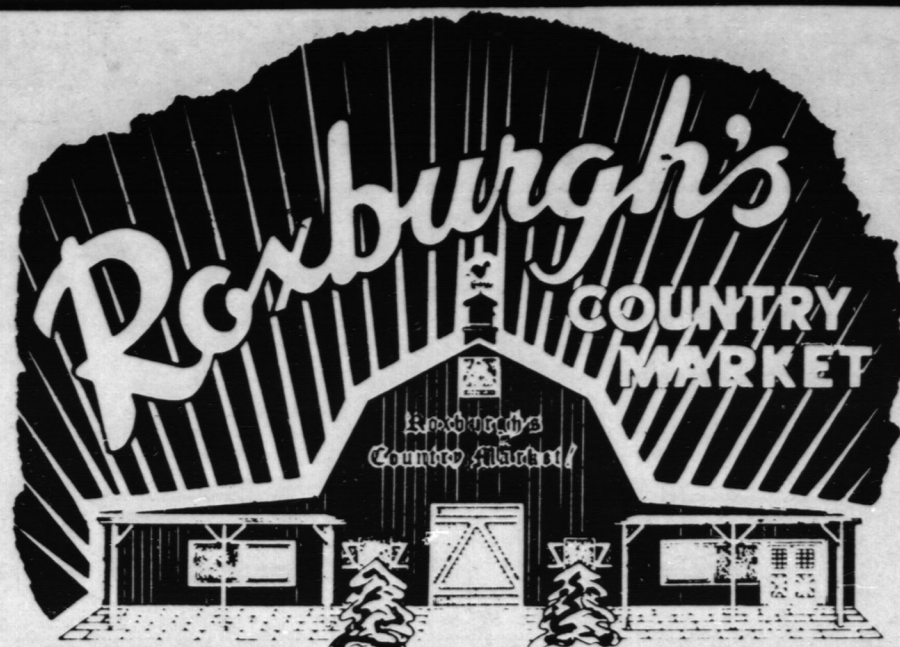
Wed. Oct. 11, District 4, Fall Conference was at Port Colborne.

Annual ACW Deanery Meeting

The Annual meeting of the Anglican Church Women of Haldimand Deanery was held in the Church of St. John, the Divine, Cayuga, Oct. 4.

A service of Holy Communion was held, with Rev. L. Ewing as celebrant assisted by Canon D.G. Huether, Rural Dean.

In his address, Rev. L. Ewing spoke of the troubles in the early church, comparable to those today. There was the problem of disunity and unbelief for others. Too many have the desire for self-fulfilment and prestige, rather than for the extension of Christ's kingdom.

Christ divested himself of divine majesty, and became least of all, a servant. All have different talents, all have gifts and should use them, not for vain-glory, but for the glory of God.

But we must not underestimate the little gifts of each individual each person is of infinite worth, our bearing towards others should show forth service for Christ.

There were 50 who partook of Holy Communion.

The Deanery Chairman, Mrs. Tookey of Dunnville, presided for the afternoon session, with Mrs. Kern, Caledonia, as secretary. The organist for the service in the morning, and pianist for the afternoon, was Mrs. Hickey of All Saints' Church, in Hagersville.

The meeting was opened with the singing of Joyful, Joyful we adore thee, followed by prayer led by Mrs. Hendriks of Hagersville.

Mrs. Armstrong of Cayuga welcomed the A.C.W. members and guests.

Mrs. Dosser of Jarvis introduced the guest speaker, Rev. Rattran of United Church.

Jarvis, whose topic for his address was, Women in the Church.

Women as well as men are all part of the body of the Church. The mission of the Church is to be a witness of Christ, also to be a servant to mankind. He spoke of the origin of the collar worn by clergymen. It is a symbol of service. He compared the role of women in the church to a drama. There were the stars, also the supporting actors, without which the stars could not succeed.

Women with their kindness, gentleness, and womanliness play important roles. They can do much to show people the way back to Christ. The award for the best supporting role goes to mothers. They have a divine responsibility to rear their children in the knowledge and love of God.

The second award would go to wives a great many successful men have attested to the support of their wives. Women should concern themselves with their fellow members, listening to their troubles, encouraging them, and making them feel they are missed when they are not out at church.

Mrs. Cooper of York A.C.W. thanked the speaker. The offering hymn was Thy Hand, O God, has guided. All eight branches answered the roll call, and paid their fees. Each branch was allotted four copies of the annual reports.

Mrs. Toohey introduced six members of the Diocesan A.C.W. Mrs. Barrett, treasurer, reported on the financial statement.

She spoke of the Project Book, which tells of the mission work of the church. The A.C.W., along with the Parish Council, may choose a project which they wish to support, and half their giving toward missions will go to that project.

Mrs. Rutherford, convener of Social Action thanked the branches for their work in helping to fill the 170 bales which were shipped to Indian Reserves in Saskatchewan. There is still a

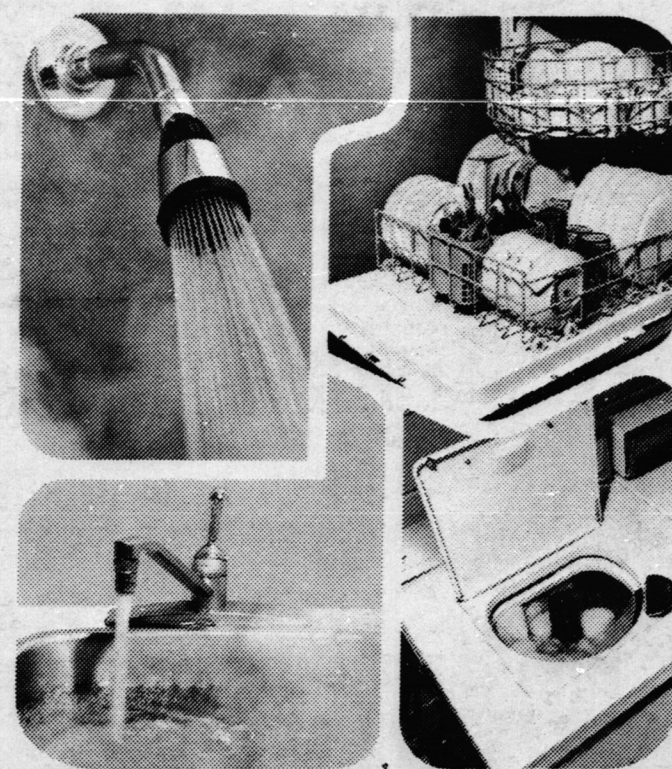
place for women's work in this regard.

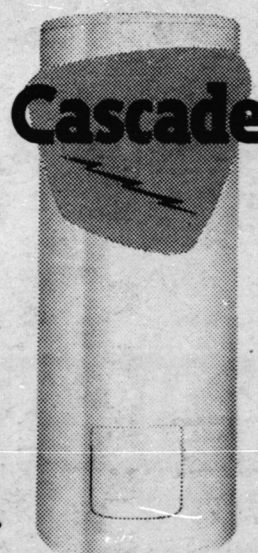
