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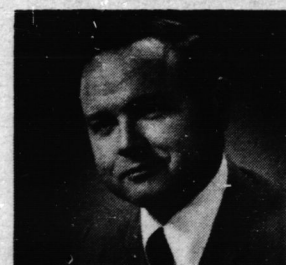

put out, firemen were able to save a pole barn to the south of the burning building and a nearby pig pen. Approximately 60 head of cattle were in the barn, but all were saved.

Jarvis firemen were assisted by the Hagersville department, under the Mutual Aid system.

As there was no abundant water supply on the farm, firemen were supplied with water by area water truckers Cam Tompkins, Roy McKeen and Bill Phibbs. Water was also supplied by Hagersville and a small tank truck used on the Miller farm was also supplying water.

Mr. Walker said the loss was estimated at \$15,000 for the barn and \$3,000 for the contents. The building was insured.

If the enumerator cannot personally contact a resident, an enumeration notice and a postage-paid, addressed envelope will be left at the property. This notice should be mailed in as soon as possible to ensure that eligible voters are included on the preliminary voters' list. This list must be in the hands of the Municipal Clerk by the Oct. 10 deadline.

The list will be published for public scrutiny and will be revised by the Municipal Clerk in early November to correct errors.

Anyone who is eligible to vote, but is not on the preliminary voters' list, can contact the clerk for inclusion.

Mr. and Mrs. Cameron Thomson and Dennis visited the Thousand Islands and Pioneer Village near Toronto last week.

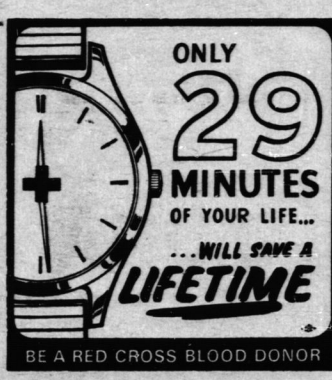
