On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - Bruce Hayden of the Ontario Milk Commission, Welland, advises that one of the Milk Commission staff will be at the Cayuga Agriculture Office to assist Haldimand dairymen on Fridays starting Sept. 8. It was suggested that dairymen wishing to contact the Milk Commission contact the office before 10 a.m. on Friday (phone 772-3381). The Milk Commission staff can of course be contacted at other times at the Welland office by calling 732-7552.

Doug Johnston of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board also expects to arrange a time that he could meet with Haldimand dairymen at the county agriculture office.

The Canada-Ontario Small Farms Development Program has recently been announced. Information available indicates that those who have been operating a farm for at least three years whose principal occupation is farming and who have assets not exceeding \$60,000 many be eligible for purchase of land under the program.

One further requirement of the Small

Farms Development Program is that the arrangement must assure that the farm unit when adjusted, will have sufficient land, labour and capital to be considered an economically viable unit. More detail about the program is expected in the near future. Apparently the local agricultural extension office and the Farm Credit Corporation are to be the local contact for farmers.

The first weekly letter from the "Grain Exchange" is due to be released on Sept. 6. Those who were familiar with last year's Corn Exchange will recall that a farmer to farmer listing of corn available or corn wanted was prepared on a regular basis. This year's exchange will include listings of oats, barley, and mixed grain, as well as corn.

Farmers wishing to list grain for sale or to list their requirements may contact the county agriculture office or contact directly W.M. Hill, Field Crop Specialist with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food at the Crop Science Department, University of Guelph.

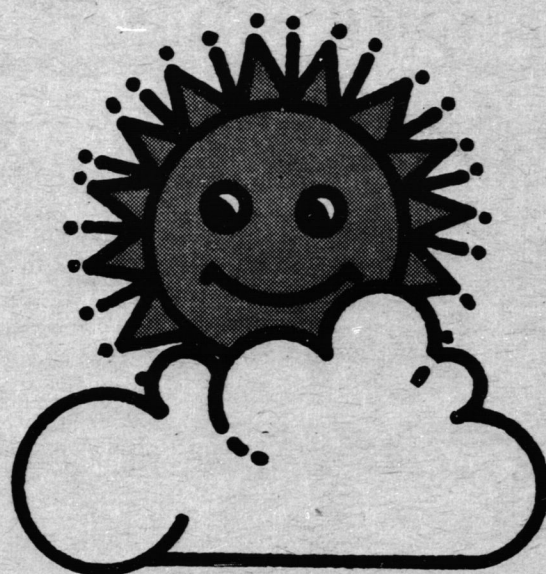

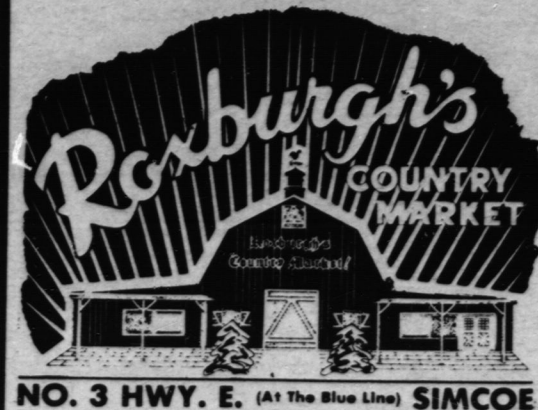
